Looking Back

"There were many Indians and French half-breeds living here as early as 1830, although their location could hardly be called a permanent one..." The first white settler in Midland County was John A. Whitman who arrived in the spring of 1836. He brought his family here that fall and built his house in what is now Ingersoll Township. For several years Mr. Whitman's only neighbors were Indians living in bark shanties and tents made of skins.

Charles Fitzhugh and John Wyman were living in the area about 1837. Julia A. Wyman was the first white baby born in Midland County on July 6, 1837.

Midland County was organized March 29, 1850. "All the territory now included in Midland, Bay, Gratiot, Isabella, Clare, Gladwin and Roscommon Counties were then included in her boundaries."

"Many incidents connected with pioneer life..." are related in Midland County's <u>Portrait & Biographical Album</u>. Needless to say, "Midland County is justly proud of her pioneer record..."

History In Brief

Like a small acorn sprouts, becomes a small twig, then grows into an oak tree with all its branches, the Midland Genealogical Society had its very beginning in an idea.

A few individuals interested in genealogy met on Thursday afternoon, June 17, 1971, in Studio 7 at the Midland Center for the Arts, and a new unit of the Midland County Historical Society was organized. Judith Wiley became acting president of the Genealogical Unit of the Midland County Historical Society.

The following year, February 17, 1972, Jan Erratt became the first elected president. Serving with her were the following officers: Dorothy Wilson, Secretary; Pat Worden, Treasurer; Dorothy Virgil, Program Chairman. Other members of the organization were: Kathryn Cummins, Bernice Freer, Bonnie Kennett, Ruth Klump, Kaye Lorton, Karen McKellar, Dorothy VanArsdale and Harry Walker.

From year to year other individuals interested in family history joined the group. It became apparent, finally, after about six and a half years, that if the Unit was to grow, larger quarters must be found. About this time, Mr. Edward Szynaka became Head Librarian of the Grace A. Dow Memorial Library, and permission was granted by him to the group to meet regularly in the library lounge. The first meeting was Wednesday, February 15, 1978. Thus, like the acorn twig, the Unit had grown. After leaving the Midland County Historical Society, the group became known as the Midland Genealogical Society.

The Society is dedicated to the compilation, preservation, study and exchange of information of a genealogical and historical nature. Its members are in various stages of research, helping one another.

Genealogical Dictionary

Familiar words in old records do not necessarily mean the same as we know them today. Below are some of the more frequently used words and their meanings during Colonial times:

brother: besides one's own brother, can also be a brother-in-law, stepbrother, husband of a sister-in-law, or "brother in the church". Also can be used to indicate friendship.

cousin: can be used to mean cousin but more often used to indicate nephew or niece or any family relationship, usually by blood.

<u>freeman</u>: literally a "free man" who has full citizenship rights. He can vote and enter into business agreements.

gentleman: a man who descends from an aristocratic family and obtains his income through land rentals. If a son left home and took up a trade, he would lose his title of gentleman. If he continued to live from land rentals or became a lawyer or minister, he would retain his title.
