### CEMETERY PROJECT

The summer was spent reading Old Calvary Catholic Cemetery and the huge Midland City Cemetery. The Johnsons have completed their year-long project of the LaPorte Cemetery, which leaves us with three more cemeteries to read before the snow flies.

### IN THE LIBRARY

Biographical Sketch Of Henry D. Rogers, contributed by Arthur E. Allen, 85 Arborway, Jamaica Plain, Mass. 02130, August 1980.

(Henry D. Rogers b. Litchfield Co., Conn. 20 June, 1817; d. Midland Village, Midland Co., Mich. 7 March, 1875; m. Rebecca (Ellsworth) Holman, widow of Sumner Holman, ca. 1836 in Phelps, Ontario Co., N. Y. Rebecca d. Midland City, Mi. 17 April, 1902. They remained in Ontario, N. Y. until ca. 1849 at which time they moved to Saginaw, Mi.)

## GENEALOGICAL DICTIONARY (cont'd.)

goodwife: the goodman's wife. The title may be shortened to "goody", i.e., "Goody Jones".

goodman: a man who ranked below a gentleman but above a freeman on the social scale.

indentured servant: a person bound to work for someone for a certain number of years, usually from 4 to 7, in exchange for passage to the "new world". This person generally at the bottom of the social scale and had few rights.

in-law: as well as the modern meaning, the term was used to indicate any relationship through marriage. Therefore, a daughter-in-law might be a step-daughter, as well as the son's wife.

inmate: a person who was married but did not own land. They were probably renters and were taxed for their personal property. This was a term used in early Pa. but may have been used in other states as well.

Jr., Sr., III, etc.: terms do not necessarily mean a father/son relationship. They were used to help differentiate between contemporaries with the same name. If Jim Jones had a cousin or nephew with the same name, the family would tack "Sr." on the oldest and "Jr." on the younger. Many times they would not even be related! If several men in a small community all had the same name, the people simply labeled them Sr. Jr., III, IV, etc. If the older Jim Jones died or moved out of the community, each man moved up a notch.

mister: only "gentlemen" could use this title. This included clergymen and those who held high civil office.

nephew: used as today but could mean, in very old records, the daughter of one's brother or sister.

now wife (also present wife): a safeguard, found only in wills and does <u>not</u> mean there had been a previous wife. If a man's wife died and he took another wife, the second wife could not claim more than her husband intended.

sister: same variations as meaning in brother.

"Sunday morning a young man named Haefka about 20 years old living about two miles out of town on Chippewa Road went to John Haywood's house nearby and while there a 10 year old son of Mr. Haywood took a 32 caliber, self-cocking revolver out of the bureau drawer and turning accidently shot Haefka, who stood only 10 feet away, between the center of the collar bone in front of the right shoulder.

"Dr. Magill was called immediately but has not located the bullet which was probably stopped by the shoulder blade. The patient was taken immediately to his home and is doing well."

# "Death of Midland Pioneer

# "One of Midland's Oldest Residents Died January 18, 1916

"Mrs. Evelyn Townsend passed away Tuesday, January 18, about 11:00 o'clock, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Sidelinker, of Heart Trouble and Pneumonia.

"Deceased was born May 28, 1833, in New York and was 82 years, 7 months and 21 days of age. She was of kind and pleasing disposition, and was loved by all who knew her.

"Mrs. Townsend was probably one of the oldest residents of Midland City having lived here for 69 years. When a girl, 14 years old, she came to Midland and attended the little log school house across the river, which was attended by the Indians.

"The funeral was held this afternoon from the home of her daughter Mrs. Horace Holden, on Ashman Street, the services being conducted by Rev. W. W. Des Autels of the Baptist Church and internment made in the Midland Cemetery.

"She is survived by four daughters, Mrs. Hattie M. Pick of South Buchannon, West Virginia, Mrs. I. Sidelinker, Mrs. Albert Moll, and Mrs. Sophronia Holden all of this city, and two sisters, Mrs. Caroline Reed of Sanford, and Mrs. Angeline Cronkright of Northern Michigan. A brother, William Patterson of Caro, who was here, had been called home owing to illness in his family and will be unable to attend the funeral."
