

MIDLAND'S PIONEER FAMILIES

In February through May, 1924 a series of articles appeared in the Midland Sun newspaper which were of the early pioneers of Midland County and were told by the pioneers themselves. The Sun asked the following questions: Who is the oldest resident of Midland County? Who has lived in Midland the greatest number of years continuously? Who has lived in Midland County the greatest number of years, though their residence may not have been continuous? Who can go back the farthest into the history of Midland County? In this and perhaps in the next several issues we would like to reprint a number of these stories. On the following pages will be found the list of those whose names were collected by the Sun.

Feb. 17. 1924 - HENRY MASHUE. On January 15 Henry Mashue observed his 50th birthday anniversary and this date also marked a half century of continuous residence in Midland county at his home in Lee Township.

Mr. Mashue was born near the old fair grounds on the farm now owned by Herbert Sias. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Baptiste Mashue, came to Midland about 70 years ago and will be remembered by the older settlers. Their first home in this city was on the present site of the First M.E. church, Mr. Mashue remembers much of the early history of Midland as related to him by his parents.

His father and "Bill" Low were employed by the government for a time, and "poled" a scow carrying from two and one—half to three ton of supplies from Saginaw to the Indians at Mt. Pleasant. They followed the water route up the Saginaw, Tittabawassee and Chippewa rivers to Mt. Pleasant, and it took a week to make the trip.

Mr. Mashue moved with his parents to the old Quarter farm, located on the old River road just east of the meridian. This farm is now owned by Stewart Gordon. He remembers the old three-story building known as the old (Continued on page 3)

Quarter House, located on the trail leading from Midland to Mt. Pleasant. It was often visited by lumbermen and men in the employ of the government. His father was often employed by these men as an interpreter, as he could speak

the French and Indian languages as well as he could English. There were only a few houses between Midland and Mt. Pleasant, and all kinds of game was plentiful. He has heard the wolves howl many times at night and seen large flocks of wild turkeys.

Mr. Mashue's father later moved into the Half-way House at the half-way dam on the Chippewa river. The dam was built with an apron made of hewed timbers eight inches thick with heavy piers on each side and large timbers reaching across from pier to pier. These timbers were about 18 inches square. The 4x4 planks used to dam up the water were called "slashes." It was necessary to watch the dam day and night in order not to let the water run over it and to always have it ready for log drives.

Mr. Mashue states that he has spent many nights at the dam so as to trip the slash when necessary. "Sometimes I would oversleep and find the water running over the dam," said Mr. Mashue. "I would then wade out in the water to the square timber and take a peevie and trip the slash. Looking back to those days, I feel that it was a very dangerous thing for a boy of 12 or 13 to do but we thought nothing of it then." He and his father looked after this dam for several years.

"John Sherwood was the first man I ever saw scaling logs. The first money I ever earned was for work I did for Sam McReary. I was about 15 then and received \$1 a day for driving logs on the Chippewa river. I have marked many logs with a marking hammer following Dave Maxwell when he was scaling."

"I note many changes in Midland county since the time I lived in the Old Quarter House when a lad to the present time. I have observed the methods of travel change from the trails lined with men and Indians walking, to the oxcart, wagon, buggy, automobile and an occasional airplane, and the trails have changed to trunk line highways. I have seen all this in the past 50 years in Midland county and often wonder what the young people of today will see within the next 50 years." After a moment's reflection, "Do you think they will be as great?" asked Mr. Mashue.

February 14, 1924 - WILLIAM JASPER a retired farmer residing in Ingersoll township, has witnessed many transformations in the epoch intervening between the developments of Midland county from an almost boundless forest into a rich farming community.

He came to Midland from Saginaw on the old river boat Bell Seymour, landing in Midland on Thanksgiving Day in the late fall of 1867. His wife and three children remained in Saginaw for a time before coming to Midland. Mr. Jasper was born in Germany in 1834.

After arriving in Midland he assisted in operating a river scow between here and Saginaw for some time. He later secured work in Owen's Grocery store where he was employed for several years. There were only a few stores in Midland at the time of his arival. He recalled Larkin's Grocery, Rhincecoff's Clothing store and Owen's Grocery. He also has the honor of riding on the first train arriving in Midland over the old F. & P.M. tracks.

Mr. Jasper states that Midland then possessed an entirely different appearance from the Midland of today. It was but a little settlement clustered around what is now the business section of the city. There was almost nothing to Midland at that time but a few scattering log houses and the settlement seemed to be full of Indians.

Mr. and Mrs. Jasper made their home for some time across the river in what is now the Fourth ward. A little later they bought a farm of 120 acres on section two in Ingersoll township. They purchased this farm of Mr.

Findlater and it has been their home for over half a century.

This farm was located in the heart of an unbroken forest and they set about to clear it up. All around the little log house where they lived were soon great piles of brush and gradually the forest receded from the cabin. They followed a blazed trail to the present river road as this was the only road in that vicinity.

Mr. Jasper recalls that they got up at 3 o'clock on Sunday mornings in order to reach Saginaw in time to attend church services.

Mr. and Mrs. Jasper recently passed their sixtieth milestone as man and wife and are among the oldest married couples in Michigan.

They are both hale and hearty for their years and hope to add many more summers before they join the silent ranks of the Old Pioneers whose toils and privations have meant so much to the present generations.

February 21, 1924 - MRS. MARY HAVENS. Mrs. Mary Havens, one of this County's pioneers, has been ill at her home in Hope for the past two weeks.

Mrs. Havens came to Midland county and sellted in Edenville Township in 1855 and later moved to Hope township. Her maiden name was Mary Jane Ellsworth and she was born in Hartland, Niagara county, New York, in 1836. She was united in marriage to Aaron Havens on March 23, 1854.

Hope township at that time was almost a wilderness and two of her children Sarah and George aged four and about three respectively, wandered away from home and became lost in a swamp where they spent the night. The whole country— side was aroused before the children were discovered the following day.

PRESIDENTS MESSAGE

Dear Members:

I have had the "good luck" recently when I approached the Midland County Probate Court to let our Society copy the Index, and now the Court Docket files for all Testate and Intestate cases, as well as Adoptions and "Insane" cases, from the early 1860's thru 1900. All these case pouches have a number, date, family name involved, and we are privileged to go thru these documents and abstract the pertinent data, namely heirs names, dates, and any oddity pretaining to a particular case.

It was a lesson in "growth" for me, having no relatives in early Midland City, and to see how long some of the Wills (or those without Wills) were held up in the courts before a settlement was reached.

The "Adoption" cases were interesting in that the Index for Midland County not only contained the blood relation name, but also the name of the person doing the adopting. One case interested me particularly... the baby boy was 16 days old, his father put him up for adoption, and apparently there were no objections, or any flaws and the adoption went forward. No mention at all of a mother... it was as if the father had carried this baby for 9 months, and now decided he was not wanted. I read this case 3 times to see if perhaps I missed the mother's name, but there was none. I'm sure that had the father carried the child, there would have been no adoption. When I see the "Right to Life" men marching on TV, I often wonder if they carried a child nine months, would they then give it up for adoption so easily.

Another case was marked "Insane", and this, too, was unusual for several reasons. Back in the late 1800's, all one had to do to declare scmeone "Insane" was to have 2 persons sign a form stating that Jane Doe had a decided loss of memory, seemed disorganized, and was hard to live with in a family setting. One particular woman was declared "Insane" and was committed to the Northern Michigan Asylum at Traverse City in 1881. Then in 1882, there she was again... having all the forms signed by the same people and readmitted. She apparently either escaped, or found some way to join the outside world. That is not all, in 1883 she was again readmitted to the Asylum. I am not at all sure just what the rules are today, but I am never again going to admit to someone that I cannot remember something. It might give somebody ideas.

I will be in Salt Lake City when our April 18th meeting convenes. Will be back for the May meeting and will report on any new developments.
