MIDLAND'S PIONEER FAMILIES

This month we are continue printing some of the series of articles with interviews of Midland pioneers which appeared in the Midland Sun newspaper February through May, 1924.

Mar. 13, 1924 - Mrs. LANPHIERD. Mrs. H. Lanphierd came to Midland county and settled on a homestead in Lincoln township in 1868, and has been a resident of this county continuously for the past 55 years. Averill was the terminus of the Flint and Pere Marquette railroad at that time.

The little settlement was then known as "Red Keg". Two hotels, a store, blacksmith shop and a saloon made up the business section of the town. The saloon was conducted by Elliot Moore: the Averill Hotel by Alfred Averill and the Lincoln House by Burt Sites(?). This hotel was located a few rods southeast of the town proper on the banks of the river. Averill was typical of all Michigan lumber towns and the store served as a supply house for the lumbermen. It later became the headquarters for the surrounding camps and was a busy place.

The wagon road ran parallel with the river and three families, George Postal, George Allswede and Jacob Hager lived on the road between Averill and Sanford, Harrison Averill owned a farm on what was then known as the Averill flats.

George Postal was killed in the fall of '69 by a pile driver while he was working on the river.

Although Mrs. Lamphierd is almost 79 years old, she wrote the Sun a very interesting letter in which she tells of attending quilting and logging bees in those early days and said that the jolly good times were much enjoyed.

She related an experience that she and some relatives had with a lynx one evening while they were returning home from church. They heard a noise in the brush and later by the light of a lantern which Mrs. Lanphierd carried, discovered a lynx on a fallen tree only a few feet from them. It followed through the swamps and woods to their home and prowled around their cabin for some time, later coming up on the porch. Within the next day or two a lynx was killed by a hunter and she has always believed it was the one that followed them through the woods.

She well remembers the mammoth rollway on the banks of the Tittabawassee river just below Averill. It is said that this was the largest rollway in the history of the Michigan lumber woods.

THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Hope you all enjoyed the holidays as much as Pat and I did. We were pleased to have all three children, their spouses and our grandchildren (five plus) with us. We even took advantage of this occasion to have a family portrait taken.

There was one note of sadness during the holidays ... Dorothy Wilson, our only Life Member and one of the group that founded our society, died on December 23, 1990. She was a highly respected genealogist ... always searching for the truth. Although her health in recent years prevented her from coming to our meetings, those of us who knew Dorothy will miss her sparkling eyes and ready smile. The Society will be donating a book to the Library in her memory.

Many of you attended the November meeting at the LDS Family History Center where Jan Kohlbrand gave us an introduction to their computer and its exciting ability to access genealogical information on CD-ROM disks. Unfortunately, the disk reader, which is the key to all that information, has since "gone down" and been sent in for repair. The CD-ROM technology is relatively new and, therefore, subject to things of this sort. When the reader is working again, you will be able to access their newest CD-ROM addition ... the SOCIAL SECURITY DEATH INDEX. On four CD's are 39.5 million records of persons whose SSA death benefit was claimed (mostly between 1962 & 1988). A limited amount of information is shown, but it may be helpful.

The January 16th meeting was sobered by news of war starting in the Persian Gulf. The average turnout included a large number of guests interested in using their computers for genealogy. I used the large screen TV as a monitor for my computer and in the middle of the demonstration, I switched over to CNN to hear the President speak. After those historic words, it was difficult to return to a subject so insignificant by comparison.

This year's Book Selection Committee is made up of Ruth Ann Casadonte, Ralph Hillman, and Nancy Lackie. They will be working toward a list worth \$1200, since the Library Director, Rose Marie Byers, confirmed to me that she will be able to match our budgeted amount of \$600.

Perhaps our most exciting future activity is the "First Families of Midland County" project. We hope to gain a substantial amount of local genealogy by offering recognition certificates to anyone proving lineage to an ancestor who lived in the county in 1894 or earlier. Maxine Mc Cullen, Pat Worden, and Gayle Hanna started the work, but they will need a lot of help! This kind of thing has been very successful in Ohio and New York, to name a few areas. In addition to the information gained, we hope to earn some money for our other projects such as the Genealogy Collection.

Early in January, I spoke to the Bay County Genealogical Society in return for our October program by their president, Bob Luce. My subject was "Researching in Midland" including the LDS Family History Center. They had between fifteen and twenty members in attendance. Jan Kohlbrand supplied me with her FHC handout to go with my information about Midland County Records. In compiling the latter, I improved my knowledge of local sources.

Mar. 20. 1924. - Mrs. HELEN FRANSEN. Mrs. Helen Fransen aged 78 years. has lived in Jerome township, Midland county, about 42 years. She tells of being frequently kept awake at night during the first and second winters after she came here, by the howling of wolves and on one occasion after on of the nocturnal concerts she found the remains of a deer which had been slain by them, in a berry swamp, near her home. Mrs. Fransen also tells an amusing story of seeing a young deer leap the fence into a pasture, close to the house and play with the horses also there, chasing them about for some time, before returning to the forest.

Mar. 20. 1924 - CHARLES H. JEFFERS. Charles H. Jeffers, aged 80 years. came to Midland county in 1871. Residing in Coleman about five years, and in Sanford since 1876. The county at that time was covered with an almost unbroken forest, and deer were plentiful. Mr. Jeffers was a section forman. and the section men habitually carried a gun on the hand car, being able to keep themselves well supplied with venison. At one time they captured a full grown deer alive. It had been run by dogs until it was exhausted. Bears were also frequently seen. There were only seven buildings in Sanford in 1876, five dwellings, Wells & Stones's store, and a surveyor's office. There were no highway bridges, but a ferry ran across the Tittabawassee river, near where the Salt river bridge is now. The cemetery had just been laid out, and there were only three graves in it.

Mar. 20, 1924 - Mrs. THEODORA ALLSWEDE. Mrs. Theodora Allswede. aged 84. came to Midland county, in 1859. Living in Jerome township. — then called town 16 - until 1864, when she and Mr. Allswede moved onto a farm near Averill, and lived there and in the village of Averill, until 1907. when they moved to Sanford. Mrs. Allswede now makes her home with her son. Fred W. Allswede. While living on the farm Mr. Allswede once shot and killed a deer, from the kitchen door of his home.

The Society is attempting to make plans for the final formatting and publishing of the Obituary Index Project. Most of the information from the Midland Sun and Times Newspapers from the period 1872 through 1927 have now been typed up and listed. Unfortunately more work needs to be done to combine files and put the text into a common format which will make the result into a publishable final form. Also, although all of the printed data was put into computer files, a number of the computer disks containing the data have disappeared. To obtain a final coherent whole, some of the data may have to be typed in again to be able to recover the data on the missing disks. Since the data now exists as a number of organized files, the recovery work will be somewhat simplified compared to the original work. We believe we know of all the persons still working on part of the remainder. but would like to hear from all who may still be working on some of it. We still need to select a final format and a common computer method which will make combination of the present nine "Times" and four "Sun" files into a single file for each as painless as possible. If anyone has computer capabilities and would like to help with this work, please also contact Ora Flaningam.

TEN-YEAR SUBJECT AND ARTICLE INDEX OF THE PIONER RECORD Pages 9. 10. and 11 of this issue contain the final three pages of the nine page subject and article index for the first TEN years of the PIONEER RECORD, VOLUMES I-X. Pages 1-3 were published in the Sept. 1990 issue (XI#1) and pages 4-6 were in the Oct. 1990 issue (XI#2). It should be pointed out that the Index is organized in three parts. Part 1 on page 1 is the index to the subject of all the Midland Genealogical Society meetings. Part 2 on pages 2 & 3 is an index of the officers of the society for the years 1980 through 1989 (the list for 1987 is missing). Part 4 of the index on pages 3-9 is the article title index of all the articles published in this time period. We have Pat Worden to thank for keeping the Index up for these ten years and allowing us to publish it here.

Birth, Death and Marriage Records -- 1867 to present

Death and Marriage indexes available for public inspection at any time. Copies of the records can be obtained by anyone (\$.50 for Xerox or \$7.00 for certified copy). If someone demonstrates a legitimate research interest, they can go thru the original records. Genealogists are o.k.; insurance salesmen, Credit Bureaus are not.

Birth indexes are <u>not</u> available for public inspection. Birth Record books are <u>not</u> available for public inspection for any reason. If an individual is eligible to receive a copy of a Birth Record, they may inspect an individual record to copy down information or obtain a CERTIFIED COPY for \$7.00 (NO \$.50 COPIES). Eligible persons include the subject individual, a parent named in the record, a legal representative or legal guardian (must have proof), a court of competent jurisdiction or an heir (any living relative of a deceased person). An heir must fill out and sign an affadavit to receive a Certified Copy of Birth.
