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### MIDLAND'S PIONEER FAMILIES

This month we continue printing some of the series of articles with interviews of Midland pioneers which appeared in the Midland Sun newspaper February through May, 1924.

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March 27, 1924 - SAMUEL MCREAVY. Samuel McReavy who was one of Midland's pioneer residents is here from Marquette county visiting his daughter, Mrs. D.G. Mode. Naturally he became interested in the Sun's pioneer articles and has favored us with a very interesting story of business in Midland in 1868 - it being October of that year that Mr. McReavy came here from Washington county, Maine. He is now past 77 years of age.

This might well be called "Midland 56 years ago" at which time Alex Findlatter ran a hotel on the site of the Austin store. William Davidson was hotel clerk - and the bar of this hotel was one of the first saloons Mr. McReavy, then past 22, had ever seen - you see he was from Maine, pioneer state in prohibition.

William Crissey had a hotel where the LaCroix Store stands. John G. Owen's store was "down at the dock" east of Benson street and specialized in feeds and grain. The James Eastman general store was where the Reardon block stands, and Frank Olmstead, uncle of C. G. Olmstead was manager.

The Brown lumber office, long since displaced the building in which Henry Rindskoff sold the pioneers either clothing or drugs. Millinery and ladies goods were to be had from Miss M. A. Mahoney in her own building just west of Taylor's jewelry store.

Edward Beardsley conducted a hardware store, about where the Brown and Beden store is - which recalls an amusing side-light on early business methods. It seems that some 28 lumbermen were in the habit of buying supplies of this hardware and one day - a busy day during which goods had been sold to all or practically all of these camps - it was found that a box of axes had been sold to one without the proper charge but to which one? That was the question - so this novel scheme was decided upon to solve the problem. Each lumberman was charged with the box of axes - it being assumed that all except one would refuse payment - but, Mr. McReavy was the only one to protest.

Benjamin F. Bradley was postmaster and the post office was near the Beardsley store.

Midland had a newspaper, George Hughes being the editor and owner of "The Independent," The office being in a small building on the present Carter site.

James Allen and William Hinckley conducted the town's early shoe business on the site of the Lowenstein stores; and Edward Medler had a

harness shop and later a hotel near the present E.L. Gardiner store. The Peoples Bank occupies the site of what was then the Wilcox's grocery.

There were three saloons, the most noted of which was Chabaneau's "Checkered Saloon" as it was known.

Leander Church, William Patrick and Joseph Meyers had a hemlock tannery on west Main Street opposite the Barstow home. Later a process of making "hemlock extract" was installed at this plant, but did not prove a successful business venture.

Brent Sias owned the present Ferd McCrary farm on M-24 and Charles Fitzhugh the Herbert Sias farm.

Back in '68 Thomas Sharp occupied the first residence on the right after crossing the Benson Bridge -- then in order came Sam Sias, George Bartlett, William Plumer, John Lovell, turning the corner Joel Dorr and Andrew J. Bates. There was no residence on the site of the Fred Sias home, but west, John Wyman, John Foster and Henry Patterson lived on farms. C.W. Sinclair lived across the road from Joel Dory.

On the left hand side across Benson Bridge George F. Keep lived in the first house, then Henry Stewart and Charles Sias -- the last named was killed by lightning in 1869 while near the old Quarter House in Homer.

Many still recall the old 4th Ward brick school - this was completed in 1868 and two teachers taught "the young idea how to shoot."

Mr. McReavy recalls that he dropped his pocket book through the floor of the "old covered bridge" on Benson Street while that bridge was in process of construction. Observing that it floated instead of sinking, Sam pursued it on a log and recovered it near the Hall shingle mill - near the Dow plant.

Referring to the "Quarter House," it was so-called because it was "quarter way" to Mt. Pleasant. There was also a "half way" and "three quarter way" house.

In those days John Sias lived where Russell Dent now does and Albert Reinhart's father in the Gus Malcolm residence, on east Main Street.

Coming into the office one afternoon Mr. McReavy learned "that one of those New Yorkers" who was working in the woods for his company had been injured and was at Mrs. Charles Sias'. Going over at once he found the doctor about to amputate the injured man's leg ~ knowing nothing of the real extent of the injury, but having reason to doubt the professional skill of this physician - Sam "allowed" that the leg would stay on and proceeded to secure another doctor. In two weeks the New Yorker was walking on the injured member - this man was John Ryan, sheriff of Midland County from 1878 to 1882.

Other prominent citizens of '68 were: Henry Hart, George F. Hemmingway, D.W. Hitchcock and J.W. Cochrane, attorneys-at-law; George F. Ball and sons, G.Will and cooley - the latter bookkeeper for John Larkin, lumberman.

Larkin operated the Larkin lumber mills, getting out his own timbers. Sam Sias had a lumber mill, also shingle and planing mill just west of the Benson Street Bridge in the fourth ward.

Sam Sias' logging operations one year included the delivery of 45 million feet to Saginaw and Bay City sawmills. John Sias and James Eastman were the other big lumber men of that date, though many were engaged in the business "on their own." John Maloney was one of the big lumbermen of a later date.

Most of Larkin's timber was up Sturgeon creek - then a logging stream. Snake Creek was also a logging stream of the early days.

The annual cut of Larkin's mills would be from 5 to 7 million feet of lumber. Timbers cut in the Sam Sias mills were used to build docks at Sault ste. Marie. He later sold his mills to Luther Dickey(?), who installed and operated a bromine plant - the pioneer of Midland's present great chemical industry.

Ingersoll was very well settled in the days of '68 - Sam D. Gaskell of that township was Judge of Probate from 1856 to 1868. The Mills, Beden, Bloggett, Chamberlain and other Ingersoll families were prominent in our early history.

Mr. Averill owned the "Red Keg" hotel at Averill - there was also a Lincoln hotel there. Edenville boasted of three hotels, and their owners were: George Higgins, Thomas Moore and Charles Axford. The counties of Midland, Gladwin and Roscommon were all included in

Midland County in 1868.
