

MIDLAND'S PIONEER FAMILIES

This month we conclude printing the series of articles with interviews of 32 of Midland's pioneers which appeared in the Midland Sun newspaper in February through May, 1924. With the conclusion of this series we will be looking for other stories of interest. Have you any suggestions? ---- ---- ---- ---- ----- -----

May 8, 1924. MRS. ANNA CRONKRIGHT - The old home will always remain the old home, no matter where one may wander over the earth. A warm spot is always found in the heart of one for the place where they spent so much of the time allotted to them on this earth. It doesn't matter whether it is the finest spot in the world or just a place drifting with the ages.

If one can't go back and receive the welcome awaiting from the folks, who are the most loyal in the world, the scenes of the past can be reviewed as one ofttimes will.

In thinking of Midland county, Mrs. Anna Cronkright, who now resides on Rural Route 1, St. Johns, has recalled a lot of memories some of them not the most pleasant, but she has taken with her remembrances that will linger pleasantly the rest of her years.

She tells of the past in a keen, interesting manner as follows:

"I came to Midland county from Canada with my grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Westbrook, in the spring of 1863. I was only 15 years old, but I well remember the long ride on the train, which we left at St. Johns, and continued our trip to St. Louis by stage. We finally arrived at our destination, the farm known as the Bince Bailey farm, then belonging to his father, Alson Bailey. This place is located in the western part of Jasper township, Midland county. Very little of the land was cleared, and the house was made of logs with a Dutch fireplace chimney.

"While living here I remember that we had to carry a smudge while we picked berries that grew so abundantly, because of the mosquitos, that made life almost unbearable for man and beast. We were also living here when that terrible cold day known as 'Cold New Year's' visited the country, and we had all we could do to keep from freezing in our little log house.

"Shortly after this I went to Midland to work in the Findlatter hotel, and I was there when the owner was married. I worked there two years and then went to keep house for my grandfather, grandmother having died a short time before.

"In the fall of the year 1867 I was married to Ira H. Cronkright, and we went to live on the farm in Jasper township which we owned for many years. Here we experienced the hardships of real pioneers while we cleared our land, planted an orchard and lumbered in the winters and farmed in the summers. Ten children were born to me, and another after we had left this first farm and moved to another farm a short distance farther west. Four of the children died in infancy and two more after they were grown and married. "Big game was plentiful in those early days and we often had venison, wild

turkey and bear meat as well as an abundance of fish on the table.

"Joy and sorrows and many thrilling experiences came to us while we

lived here and struggled to make a home for our children. One incident I shall never forget was when my baby lay dead in the house while a pack of wolves were howling their terrible chorus outside."

"Indians visited us too, sometimes, and I was always afraid of them, although I knew they were supposed to be civilized. Once a big red man stopped at the door and asked for a whetstone with which to sharpen his knife. I was alone with my little children, and my first thought was to run, but knowing that I never could get away safely with them. I determined to stay and die with them if necessary. After he had sharpened his knife, though, he returned the whetstone and went on his way, leaving us safe but badly frightened.

"And so we worked and planned, clearing two farms in Midland county. We lived on the second one until my husband died in the winter of 1909, since which time I have lived with my children. But no home ever seems more pleasant then Midland county, where the best part of my life has been spent. x0x0x0x x0x0x0x x0x0x0x x0x0x0x x0x0x0x

May 22. 1924. Mrs. HILAH GRAY - The following very interesting pioneer article deals with one of the romantic localities of Midland county - Edenville to the present generation - but Town 16 to all oldtimers. We are indebted to Mrs. Hilah Gray, daughter of the late Sylvester Erway, for this story from Edenville - she is the first white girl born in Edenville township.

I will mention a very few hardships during the first two years David Bowman and Sylvester Erway lived in Edenville, Midland county. Of course there were no roads of any description, just Indian trails, so they had to

get their provisions and flour at saginaw and had it brought up on a scow or canoes as long as they could paddle canoes. Then when the river was froze up in winter they would go down on the ice with oxen and sleighs. During the first two years here, while running the mills — and they had eight or ten men — provisions got very scarce one fall, especially flour — and the river froze up early, but the ice being thin they could not go with the ox team or canoe to Saginaw. Daniel Bowman, my grandfather, being that sort of a man, realized that something must be done, and he was one of those kind of men that would find a way or make one.

For two or three days he studied, and was so worried that the men noticed that he did not act very jovial. One morning he got up and said "Woman," to his wife, "put me up enough grub to last four days; I am going to Saginaw." So she put up the eatables and he took it across his shoulder in a bag and started out - he made the trip in four days all right, and what do you think he brought back in the bag? Well, it was a mill you could fasten to a wall to grind corn into meal. Say, that mill ran three weeks night and day, and folks came from Hope and all the neighbors in Edenville ground their corn into meal to make Johnny cake. Of course it tasted better than it does now. They lived through it all too.

From April 20, 1854, to April 20 1924, as far back as 70 years, Daniel Bowman and family of four children are of the first settlers of Edenville township, Midland county. Sylvester Erway came to this county from St. Clair county with Mr. Bowman and family to settle in Edenville. Bowman's location is just across the gully south of Edenville school No. 1. Sylvester Erway's location is now owned by James Second. The farm is about one-half way from Edenville cemetery and the road running east and west, going east on the south side of the road.

Daniel Bowman set to work right away, building a log cabin an a ingle mill. The mill was located on-half mile below what is now Thomas Swanton's farm, on the east side of the Tittabawassee river. Sylvester Erway, then a single man, ran the shingle mill for Mr. Bowman with seven or eight men. They were about six months completing the shingle mill They ran this mill together for about two years, then Daniel Bowman built a water power saw mill about ten rods from Edenville school house No. 1, south in the gully. This moll was run by different people for about 15 years.

Daniel Bowman's oldest girl, Julietta was about 15 years of age when they came to Edenville, and the second girl - her name is now Hannah Erway, mother of C.L. Erway and Mrs. Liona Brown. All of Hannah Erway's sisters are now dead but one, Josephine Hayner, who lives up north. She had lost one brother, Charles Bowman, who died a few years ago. He was a big lumberman, about six feet tall, and weighed about 200 pounds. Remember, Daniel Bowman and Sylvester Erway came here in April, 1854, and at the end of two years, in 1856, Sylvester Erway (26) and Julietta Bowman (17) were the first couple married in Midland county. On May 27, 1857, Hilah Erway, the first while female child was born in Edenville. The first male child born in Hope, Midland county, was James Rooker, on May 29, 1857. He is living today on a farm in Hope.

My parents Sylvester and Julietta Erway have both been called away by death, but they lived 53 years of wedded life together. Sylvester Erway, my father was supervisor of Edenville township more times than any other two men. My parents were married April 20, 1856. The place where they were married was at that time in Jerome township, but now Edenville. - halfway between Edenville and Sanford. They were married by a justice of the peace, whose name was Egbert.

Hannah Erway if she lives until the 22nd of next July, will be 83. Hilah Erway Gray will be 67 on May 20. Both are well and happy.

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May 29, 1924. ELIJAH W. POTTER - The people of Midland county are beginning to appreciate more and more the trials, hardships, privations, fears, dreads disappointed hopes and blasted ambitions of the pioneer families of Midland county as these historical features appear from week to week in this paper. These early history stories of the pale-face explorers into the red man's domain in this county have aroused keen interest in all parts of the county.

Elijah W. Potter, who has been a resident of Midland county for over 76 years, has seen it transformed from a wilderness into stretches of beautiful farm land. He has witnessed the growth of Midland from a few straggling log huts to a business and manufacturing center of beautiful homes.

Elijah W. Potter was born in Livingston county, New York, and when he was a babe about four weeks old his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Potter arrived in Midland and moved into a log house which stood just across the road from the present home of Herb Sias, west of the fairground. They later bought a home on the present site of the new cemetery where they lived for several years.

Their next move was to a point on the river opposite the old ferry just above the present site of the upper bridge. Mr. Potter assisted his father operating ferries at two points on the river for over five years. When the upper bridge was completed the ferry became obsolete.

An old scow was used as a ferry boat and was operated with pulleys and a heavy rope stretched across the river. The ferry was pulled across the river by hand and if a heavy load was being ferried across it required at least two or three men to pull the boat across. A team and loaded wagon was taken across for 50 cents, a team and empty wagon 25 cents and canoes were used to transport passengers.

Mr. Potter remembers John Wyman, Henry Eastman, Charles Rodd, John Larkin and John Whitman and many others of the first pioneers of Midland County.

He was particularly interested in telling of his exploits in hunting big game. He recalls that he killed 12 out of 13 deer captured on one hunting trip and of seeing 12 bears on the Herb Sias farm. He also recalls seeing seven bears at another time on the banks of the Sturgeon. He tells of spearing sturgeon in the river just above the upper bridge. He recalls one sturgeon he and his father speared that weighed 120 pounds and was 16 feet in length. He says that this particular fish put up a wonderful fight and that when it swam under their boat it was upset and the were precipitated into the river. He also told of fishing with the Indians and how they run "bloods lines" across the river which had the effect of driving the sturgeon out of the deep holes and into shallow water.

Mr. Potter states that he grew up with the Indians and that they always treated him kindly and that they made good neighbors. He says that in many ways they were far more honorable than some of the white settlers of that time. He has a small collection of arrow heads which he prizes.

He remembers working for John A. Whitman when his son, James Whitman, now the oldest pioneer resident of Midland county was a mere lad. He tells of working on the river with Leonard Reed of Sanford, when they "poled" scows up the river with supplies for Midland.

Mr. Potter has made many trips on the old river boat Belle Seymour between Midland and Saginaw. He says that the best was of the sidewheel type and that it was about 70 feet long and about 30 feet wide. He remembers the big forest fire of 1870 and with others fought fires for three days and nights in the vicinity of Bullock creek. He recalls when tea was sold out of

the local stores at \$1.70 to \$2.00 per pound and flour sold for \$14.00 a barrel.

After Mr. Potter grew to manhood he in time became a lumberjack and worked in many of the camps of Midland county. As the county became denuded of its forests he turned his attention to farming and has lived for many years on his farm in Homer township.

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This concludes the series of interviews with Midland Pioneers originally published in the Midland SUN newspaper, March to May 1924.

OBITUARY PROJECT

With the receipt of several files from Mrs. Anger and Pat & Bill Worden since our last report, the obituary project now has only about 70 pages of material to recover to be complete enough to publish. As you might remember from our last report, a number of the computer files from which the obituary index was printed have disappeared. The files still missing are all from the Midland Republican paper and cover the years 1885-1887, 1888-1890, 1891-1896, 1911-1915, and 1916-1919.

We have attempted to "scan" the files into a computer with optical character recognition software (OCR) and have had no success. The scanning required only a few minutes, but the OCR required about 20 minutes per page and identified only about 10% of the characters successfully. The dot-matrix printing of the pages is just too small and indistinct for OCR to work.

We will just have to retype the missing pages again.

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FIRST FAMILIES OF MIDLAND COUNTY

Nearly 200 people attended the Midland genealogical Society's 1992 awards night for the First Families of Midland County. Those attending were treated to Harriet Raymond's dulcimer, Gary Skory's early Midland County slides, and the presentation of 537 Ancestral Certificates to 153 descendants.

To qualify for one of these certificates, you must "prove" your ancestor lived in Midland County before 1895. If your ancestor was here before 1875 he or she is considered a "pioneer," and if they were here between 1875 and 1894, they are considered "settlers." In the first year of the project there were 97 settlers and 65 pioneers with identified names like Haley, Townsend, Baker, Cronkright, Reardon, etc.

The prime objective of the First Families of Midland County is to identify and honor the memory of these early "pioneers" and "settlers," their contribution to our county and to honor their descendants.
