WHERE HAVE YOU BEEN/WHERE ARE YOU GOING?

Morrow County, Ohio, An OGS Mini-Convention

The first speaker, Dr. James N. Holm, Kent Co., Ohio, enthusiastically and ably supported by his wife, told us about researching in Pennsylvania, especially at the State Land Office in Harrisburg. The talk was fairly general but he sprinkled in comments like where to stay in Harrisburg, suggesting we "stay in a motel west of the river to avoid downtown traffic." Highlighting the presentation was a narrative dramatizing the naturalization of his first U.S. ancestor.

The second speaker entirely missed his audience. His subject was the use of home computers in genealogy. He quickly lost most people with technical jargon and a disconnected presentation. Many attendees were more helpful in their remarks than the speaker. We managed to learn more at lunch than during the program. The main point that he missed was that the home computer is not something everyone will want to invest in but it can be very helpful in the filing and sorting of names, dates and places.

After we enjoyed a lunch of Amish style cooking, the third speaker, Ferne Reedy Lubbers, discussed Colonial land records, specifically those of New Jersey. She emphasized that she was speaking about the period of time up to the Revolutionary War. Land records are very important in genealogical researching because they help to locate relationships and should always be searched. She talked about people moving between New York and Philadelphia via New Jersey pointing out the difference between East Jersey and West Jersey. During the Colonial period when the Crown was still in charge, many of the records were taken back to the Mother country. One amusing comment she made was that "Scotch comes in bottles while Scots come in kilts."

The fourth speaker, a local authority in Morrow County, told us that the county had been formed by four other counties prior to 1848. Also, the local society is working on cemetery readings.

Following the Seminar, we tramped through various cemeteries, several of which we found to be overgrown with weeds, brush and trees. We also learned that we should keep our "cemetery kit" in the car at all times since we were forced to purchase blue carpenter's chalk at a local hardware store and therefore, left a trail cf "blue" stones all over the county to mark our work!

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"BLACK NOW BELIEVED AMONG FIRST PILGRIMS

"Plymouth, Mass.

August 20, 1981

"Historians said yesterday they have enough evidence to suggest one of the first settlers of the Plymouth colony in New England was a black man.

"'We have decided...and we are about as definite on this as we can be...that he came to Plymouth in 1623,' said Robert Marten, director of programs at Plimoth Plantation, a village recreating the early settlement. "'He was not there as a slave or that sort of thing' Marten said, adding that the black...Abraham Pearce...apparently owned land, voted and had equal standing in the community, which was spelled 'Plimoth' at the time.

"Some historians have thought for years there was a black Pilgrim, but Marten said only recently have researchers compiled enough documentation to substantiate the claim.

"'The presence of a black man in early Plymouth shatters the popular stereotype of the strictly European Pilgrim' Marten said.

"In June, plantation officials installed a black modern-day Pilgrim to take part in the village's activities for tourists, said Richard Ehrlich, director of education.

"The decision to place a black Pilgrim in the village was made after the 'body of information' was re-evaluated, he said, noting historians in the past have disagreed over the issue.

"By combing through the colony's records, researchers believe the black Pilgrim arrived at Plymouth...about 40 miles south of Boston... three years after the first 100 settlers on the Mayflower landed at Plymouth Rock.

"The only reference to Pearce's color is a colony record dated 1643, listing the names of men available to serve in the Plymouth militia. The list said: 'Abraham Pearce, blackamore.'

"But records indicate Abraham Pearce...or variations in the spelling ...came to the colony on the wind-swept coast of Massachusetts as an indentured servant aboard the Anne, a ship that sailed from England.

"Although researchers have no proof, they suspect Fearce was born in the West Indies and was brought to Jamestown, Va. as a slave in 1619. He apparently crossed the Atlantic before returning to the New World.

"When Plymouth was incorporated in 1633, Pearce was listed as a freeholder and a voting member of the community. Between 1633 and 1637, Pearce received cattle under a community division system, bought land and then sold his house and garden, records show.

"'He was also one of the leading figures in the community.' Marten said.

"Marten said Pearce died in 1673, around the time racial attitudes began to change in New England with the advent of slavery.
