A project is underway to scan the full index, correct errors, reformat it, and then put it on our web site in a searchable form.

A guide to the genealogical references in the **Midland Room** of interest to patrons looking for **German ancestors** is at the proofreading stage. Doug Applegath is working on a similar guide for research of **Canadian** genealogy. He has also provided to the Midland Room a list of his private collection of material on Canadian genealogy. It is located in the vertical file under "Canada". I would encourage other members with special interests and knowledge to assemble Guides for other topics, states, or countries. The objective is to have paper handouts so patrons can find all of the references in our library collection on the selected topics.

All of the Midland Room **computer users** are requested to fill in a green trouble sheet when the computer crashes (freezes up) or gives an error message. Attention by the library staff will go only to frequent and documented problems. I plan to volunteer most **Thursday afternoons** in the **Midland Room** so stop by if you are having problems with using the computer.

Free DAR Patriot Lookup Service

The **Daughters of the American Revolution** records are among the most valuable genealogy resources available. Now the society is offering to look up information for members and non-members alike. Best of all, the service is free.

Quoting from the DAR Web site:

The DAR Patriot Index contains names of Revolutionary patriots, both men and women, whose service (between 1775 and 1783) has been established by the National society, Daughters of The American Revolution. Additional information available may include: dates and places of birth and death, name(s) of wife (wives) or husband(s), rank type of service, and the state where the patriot lived or served. If pension papers are known to exist, that fact will be included.

2002 MGS TRIP TO SALT LAKE CITY - Jo Brines

The MGS periodical trip to visit the LDS Family History Center in Salt Lake City has been scheduled for next spring from Tuesday, April 23 to Tuesday, May 1, 2002.

Members will be staying at the **Best Western Motel**, which is approximately a two minute walk from the FHC Library. Cost, including taxes, is **\$90.00 per night per room** (not per individual). This motel is very nice, economical and very CONVENIENT. Ten rooms have been reserved for twenty persons.

Travel arrangements will be made as a **group** in cooperation with Circle Travel Agency. Jo Brines is coordinating the trip and is hoping those interested will sign up as soon as conveniently possible. Ten members have already committed.

The **FHC Library** has undergone many improvements since our last **MGS** visit. These include the addition of **more computers** and **improved access** to microfiche data. Those of us who have traveled to **SLC** before will all attest to how **fulfilling** a **week** of concentrated research can be. You will be looking at, for the most part, **copies of the original records** that you would find only at the actual site. There are millions and millions of film reels to choose from. We at one time calculated that it was cheaper to travel to SLC for a week than it was to have lots of films sent to Midland on a rental basis. Also, it's a lot of **fun**!

Remember, you are looking at microfilm copies of the actual records found in the court houses, etc.; NOT what someone else has interpreted the record to be and entered into the computer. Let your own eyes and mind do the interpreting.

It is a great week to be with genealogical friends – to share your successes, your failures and dead-ends, and also gain new ideas on how to approach a problem. So rev up the enthusiasm, start saving your money, reserve the week from April 23 through May 1, 2002, for genealogical research, companionship and fun and we'll fly away to **Salt Lake City**.

MGS October 17 General Meeting

The October **MGS** meeting was held at the new Conference Room located on the property of the **Bradley House**. President **Bob Mass** opened this well attended meeting and introduced **Ken Schweitzer**, a member of the **MGS Program Committee**.

Schweitzer's title for this member participation program was "Unexpected Sources When Doing Genealogy Research". He shared two personal success stories where unexpected situations resulted in obtaining valuable genealogy information about his ancestors.

Many other members shared successful genealogical research experiences. Several members discussed interesting experiences where they discovered relatives, while visiting towns where their ancestors lived, because these individual bore a "family resemblance" and were recognized as probable relatives.

Schweitzer closed with the comments "Researching genealogy is fun, frustrating, rewarding, demanding and when one finds information that is unexpected – exhilarating. It takes a great deal of persistence, at times, maybe it's the nature of the hunt – but the successes make one feel it's all worth while."

FAMILY CHRONICLE REVIEW

Fledging and experienced genealogists understand the value of research when seeking to gather hard data about ancestors and family history. The challenge is to locate where to find these valued resources. Much can be gained from digging into vital records, visiting old cemeteries, searching through archival records, visiting libraries, checking old newspaper files, searching the Internet, etc.

The genealogy room at the **Grace A. Dow Memorial Library** has a relatively **new periodical** which provides a great deal of helpful information to genealogists, both old and new. This periodical, provided through the generosity of an anonymous MGS member, is called "Family Chronicle – The Magazine for Families Researching their Roots". It is published bi-monthly.

Family Chronicle contains feature articles as well as regular columns, such as News & Letters, Research Resources, You Wanted to Know & Web Sites. The articles are well written, not too technical or complicated, informative and interesting. Normally there is a balance between old fashioned genealogical research and computer/internet related research. The September/October 2001 issue was a Special 5th Anniversary Issue and listed all the feature articles of the past 5 years.

A review of the current issue, **November/December 2001**, contains an article that ties very closely to our October **MGS** program, which dealt with finding unexpected sources of family history information. The article concerns the use of the Internet to provide some "**Brickwall Solutions**" (pg 33) and contains helpful suggestions to genealogists who have



run into that proverbial "Brickwall" in their own research. An **example** provided was a researcher's attempt to locate a town in England, where her father was born, but no longer exists on current maps. The author, out of frustration, made an inquiry on an **Internet message board** and received a response which correctly located the town she was seeking. This new information enabled her to find the birthplace of her father as well as the nearby location of the church where her grandparents were married.

Another article in this issue provides a variety of family history resources available on the Internet (pg. 29). For example, the American Life Histories site: (memory.loc.gov/ammem/wpaintro/w pahome.html) provides a fascinating collection of American folklore collected by the US-WPA

(Work Project Administration). This collection "chronicles American remembrances of education, occupations, politics, religion, medical needs and everyday life. Stories were handed down from older generations" or resulted from face to face interviews with participants of mid-19th century history.

British history from 1750-1900 also lives on the web. (pg. 30) This collection can be accessed via (spartacus.school/net.co.uk/Britain.html). The site covers "all facets of British life and British history". As an example, in the mid-1800's "factory accidents were so

frequent that an 1842 German visitor to Manchester noted he had seen so many people in the streets without arms or legs that it was like living in the midst of the army just returned from a campaign". Is it any wonder that so many Brits emmigrated to North America seeking a better life.

One of the most valuable articles in the current issue is "What is a GEDCOM File?" (pg 17). The author (Jim Byram) explains what the name means (GEnealogical Data COMmunication) and describes how data is filed and ordered. He discusses what the various CODES or tags mean and how individuals and families are linked. He further explains how an individual genealogist can import GEDCOM files into their own personal genealogy software.

If you have not taken the opportunity to explore this new periodical "Family Chronicle", the next time you visit the Midland Room in the Library please do so. You will find it an interesting, if not, invaluable resource. This review has only touched on a few examples of the usefulness of this resource.

Have fun reading and using this fascinating periodical resource.

MGC DELEGATES REPORT - Kathy Bohl

As reported in the last *Pioneer Record*, the *Michigan Genealogical Council* has a project to assemble the data of persons who died on or before 1900 for which there are **no official Michigan death records**. When enough records are received, the **MGC** plans to publish them for distribution and use of genealogists.

Forms are available in the **Midland Room** at the genealogy desk. If you have ancestors who have no official Michigan record of their death, please complete one of these forms and return it to the Lansing address contained on the form. The **Council** also requests that any **contributor include their name and address** on the completed form since there is no place on the form for that information.

At the request of the MGC and our MGS delegates, the forms and information for the **Death Without Official Michigan Record** project are reproduced in this issue of the **Pioneer Record** on Pages 11, 12 & 13.

Another **issue** being pursued by the **Council** is the length of time before the public has access to certified birth records. **Senate Bill 0794** has been approved in committee and will now go to the Senate floor to be voted on. It will allow any person to obtain a certified copy of birth records over **100 years old** from the state registrar or a local registrar. This **lowers** the present requirement from 110 years to 100 years for access to birth records. **Members** of the Midland Genealogical Society are urged to contact **State Senator Bill Schuette** and request him to **vote for passage**. Primary Sources are defined as contemporary and/or government records made at the time of the event by the parties involved. These records are acceptable sources in proving relationship from one generation to another:

1.	Census Records	Federal Census Mortality schedules. Taken 1850, 1860, 1870, 1880. Prints from the film should accompany the registration form. Transcripts from films are not acceptable as proof.
2.	Probate Records	Wills/estates (testate-with will; intestate-without will); guardianship lists of heirs and relationship; name changes; and sometimes transfer of real estate. Records begin at the formation of the county and are found in the Probate Court where the event occurred.
3.	Land Records and Plats	Purchase and sale of property often shows residency and marital relationship. Available from the county where the land was owned, records may be maintained by the Register of Deeds. Some proofs of death may occur here.
4.	Tax Records	Taxes were paid on property owned on a yearly basis. Records are available from the time of the county's formation. Records may be located in the Register of Deeds and/or Treasurer's office in county where land was located or in township record repositories. Changes in ownership may determine time of death.
5.	Military Records	Records include muster-in and muster-out, pay vouchers, pension papers, and military bounty land warrants (before 1856)for:WWI (1914-1918), Spanish-American War (1898-1899); Civil War (1861-1865); Indian and other wars (1816-1898); Mexican War (1845-1849); War of 1812 (1812-1815); Revolutionary War (1775-1783). Records are available from the National Archives and Records Service, 8th and Pennsylvania Avenue, N.W.Washington, DC, 20408; or Michigan History Division, 717 W. Allegan, Lansing, MI, 48918. Indexes of Michigan Civil War soldiers are available. Pension applications, granted or refused, are acceptable as proofs.
6.	Church Records	Church records often contain birth, death, marriage, and funeral information on their membership.
7.	Cemetery Records	Actual records of church, city or township sextons. The Library of Michigan published the Michigan Cemetery Atlas and the Michigan Cemetery Source Book .
8.	Mortuary Records	Actual records of funeral home may include death date, burial date, location of interment, obituaries and miscellany.
9.	Burial and Transport	Found in village, city, and township halls or county health departments. Record Information varies from death date to personal comments.
10.	Court Records	Civil, criminal, divorce, and naturalization records begin from formation of the county and may be located in circuit court or superior court where the event occurred. Some proofs of death may be found in this group.

Secondary Sources are any sources in print that do not come from a contemporary or government. One of these records alone might not be acceptable as proof of a death without official Michigan record.

1.	Bible Records	Dated and/or undated. Include photocopies of the pages showing the publisher, date of publication, names, date, and events. Identify current owners of the Bible when known. This must be accompanied by a residence location.
2.	Obituaries	Dated with name of newspaper and location. Most libraries contain copies of local newspapers. The Library of Michigan has extensive holdings of micro-filmed Michigan newspapers available through interlibrary loan to Michigan libraries. Photocopies of original articles are requested. Prints from unidentified films or photocopies of unidentified obituaries do not serve as proof, but are accepted as supplemental material.
3.	Newspaper Clippings	Dated with name of newspaper and location. Clippings may include anniversaries, biographical sketches, awards, marriage notices, reminiscences, etc. Prints from films or photocopies of actual clippings are requested.
4.	Family Histories/	When submitting this type of material include a copy of the title page, pages Genealogies, Published showing direct ancestral descent and state location of the book. The Library of Michigan has a large statewide collection. Local libraraies may have some local genealogies.
5.	County Histories/ Portrait & Biographical Histories, Published	Almost every county of Michigan has at least one county history with biographical sketches. The Library of Michigan published the Guide to the Michigan Genealogical & Historical Collections at the Library of Michigan and the State Archives of Michigan (published 1996 by the Michigan Genealogical Council, PO Box 80953, Lansing, 48908-0953) listing Michigan census, county histories and vital records, transcribed and original materials.
6,	City/County Directories	The Library of Michigan has an exatensive statewide collection of Michigan city directories with out-of-state directories prior to 1860 on microfiche and from 1861 forward on microfilm.
7.	Personal Papers/ Manuscripts	Unpublished written data include letters, diaries, journals, reunion records, and manuscripts. For example, the Library of Michigan has 450 boxes of manuscripts.
8.	Tombstone Inscriptions	Photographs or transcriptions of the stones. Locations of Michigan cemeteries are shown in the Michigan Cemetery Atlas and companion volume, the Michigan Cemetery Source Book , published by the Library of Michigan.
9.	Atlas/Landowners	The Library of Michigan has an extensive statewide collection of landowner plat books. Look also at local libraries.



MIDLAND CITY, MICHIGAN

1883 & 1895

The old, open envelopes on this page reflect an image of early Midland history with a little genealogy attached.



Midland City, Michigan,

Is the most important and thriving village on the line of the Flint & Pere Marquette Railroad, between East Saginaw; and Ludington. It has a population of about 2,500; is s'tuated in the south-east part of Midland county, at the confluence of the Tittabawasse and Chippawa rivers. The county has a population of about 5,000 and is rapidly increasing. No place offers better inducements for settlers. The lands are first-class, and will make fine farms; are well watered and timbered with Oak, Beech, Maple, Ash and other woods; are easily durined, and can be purchased at a reasonable price.

In the village are two grist mills, one having a capacity of too bible per dry, and using the new roller process, also several saw and shingle mills, one Bromide factory, the largest in the world, five salt blocks, two machine shops, and a planing mill.

These factories require a large amount of wood yearly, and those desiring to clear land, can make the wood pay for the clearing.

The village has one twenty thousand dollar school house, and two a naller ones, with an efficient corps of teachers in each, five churches and two newspapers. The contract has been let to pave Main street for a distance of che mile in length and sixty-four feet wide, with cedar blocks. Holly water works are in operation with four miles of pipe. Its mineral springs are noted for its wonderful cures. Holel accommodations are good, and business of all kinds excellent. It is the county seat, and its citizens are wide awake and enterprising.

This envelope, with a corner card of Reardon Brothers in upper left front, has on its reverse side a splendid, eloquent summary of the glories of Midland in 1883. This letter was mailed from Midland via the Ludington & Toledo R.P.O. as indicated by the cancel; it also has a manuscript "July 7/83" on its left front side. The cover was sent to Flint and arrived within 2 days as per the backstamp cancel dated "FLINT, 9 July 1883". R.P.O. is an abbreviation for Railway Post Office.

This 1895 open envelope, with an imprint of Reardon Brothers Mercantile Co. in upper left front, has also on its reverse side an excellent "Chamber of Commerce" description of Midland in its early days. This letter, mailed from Midland via the Ludington & Monroe R.P.O, was sent to Saginaw E. S. and received "12 May 1895" as per the backstamp. The description of the Midland area in 1895 is very interesting. The 1895 Michigan Gazetteer describes Midland with the following: 11 lawyers, 29 justices of the peace, 3 veterinarians, 7 doctors, 2 newspapers, 7 churches and 5 saloons.
