

Please come and enjoy a very interesting and informative presentation.


The normal business of the society will be conducted after the presentation as well as special reports. Refreshments will be served at the end of the meeting.

An eight-page **Gulde** has been assembled which references all the books, special documents and media that contain genealogical information about our county. Free copies are available. They should be especially helpful to out-of-towners who characteristically have limited research time. Should this guide be posted on our Web site????

Many of us expect a higher level of accuracy in a document written by a person present at a past event and written at the time the event occurred. I am working on a future newsletter article about an erroneous emigration date in my Grandfather's diary.

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MGS TRIP TO FAMILY HISTORY LIBRARY SALT LAKE CITY

Our "Fearless Leader" Jo Brines had made reservations for all of us at a downtown hotel not more than 50 yards from the entrance to the Family History Library. This was a phenomenal location and provided ready access to not only the Library but to Temple Square directly across the street. We typically found ourselves ready to enter the Library at exactly 7:30 AM every morning the Library was open. On many days, some of us also walked with the LDS volunteers when they exited the Library at closing time (10:00 PM).



The Family History Library proved to be all that proponents claim it to be. The reference material available to users is enormous. Material is organized and readily available. Staff and volunteers are ever present to answer questions and provide assistance. All is readily accessible and there is no admission fee. There are only minimal charges for photocopies of data one wishes to take home for further study and research.

We concur that in order to make the most productive use of our time, pre-planning prior to the trip was essential. Determining what information we wanted to gather, identifying the questions that needed answers (hopefully). and even listing the Soundex letters for the surnames to be researched were all beneficial and time saving strategies. However, the greatest benefit of doing research at the Family History Library was the fact that data was on site. Researching census data from 1870 to 1920, from all over the country, was as simple as walking from one end of a room to the other.

I left Salt Lake City with a great deal of new information about both my mother's and father's families. It was exciting to actually locate my maternal great-grandmother's name on a ship's passenger list in 1864; and then to locate a picture of the ship. Steamships were in use at that time so the trip from Europe to North America was not as long or as harsh as those trips taken on sailing vessels which typically lasted 40 or more days. I have a greater appreciation for the hardiness of our immigrant ancestors, for they withstood many trials and tribulations in order to find a "better life" for themselves and their families.

A trip to the Family History Library in SLC is not something everyone can manage. But, if the opportunity is presented, it is highly recommended. To quote "Fearless Leader", "it's cheaper to travel to SLC for a week than to have lots of films sent to Midland on a rental basis".

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TERMINOLOGY OF RELATIONSHIPS

It is usually puzzling, particularly at family reunions, to fully understand the terms used to explain relationships between kin. Questions such as, "Is Aunt Mary my grandaunt or greataunt?" or, "What's the difference between "first cousin once removed" and "second cousin"?" Both of these questions were posed at a recent family reunion.

Sam Levy submitted the following information that helps to explain the "terrninology of relationships". Hopefully you will find the information helpful. The explanations use you, the reader, as the base for the relationships.

Grand

Aunts and uncles follow the same pattern as grandfather and grandmother. The brother of a grandparent is a granduncle; the sister is grandaunt. From then on it follows the same pattern of "greats" that apply to grandparents.

Grandparents' siblings should be referred to as grandaunts and granduncles though you call them Aunt X and Uncle Y.

Uncle and aunt

Your parents' brothers and sisters, and their spouses. You do not need a blood connection to be a full-fledged aunt or uncle. Your mother's sister's husband is not your "uncle by marriage". He is your uncle, period.

Niece and Nephew

Sons and daughters of your siblings and siblings-in-law. As with uncles and aunts, they are not your "nieces and nephews by marriage", they are your nieces and nephews, plain and simple, even if they're your spouse's siblings' children and do not have a single drop of blood in common with you.

First Cousin, Full Cousin

Children of your parents' brothers and sisters. You and your first cousins share one set of grandparents.

Double First Cousins

If a pair of brothers marries a pair of sisters, their kids are not only first cousins, they're double first cousins: They have both sets of grandparents in common.

You and the children of your parents' cousins are second cousins and share at least one great-grandparent. Your child and your cousin's child are second cousins.

Third Cousins

You and the children of your parents' second cousins are third cousins and share at least one great-great-grandparent. And so on with the fourth, fifth, and sixth cousins.

First Cousin Once Removed

A relationship that is removed is one that exists in two different genealogical generations. Generation refers to the order of birth, a genealogical level. Your aunt and your mother may have been born 20 years apart, but they are still of the same generation. Your parent's first cousin is your first cousin once removed. The child of your first cousin is also your first cousin once removed: your grandparent is that child's great-grandparent.

Grandaunt and Granduncle

We always called grandpa's sister "great-aunt." But the experts say that terminology is incorrect. These terms are. (Which doesn't mean we have any intention of using them.)

Great-Grandaunts. Great-Granduncles

Your great-grandparents' brothers and sisters.

In-Laws

Family by marriage: Your spouse's parents, spouses of your siblings, and spouses of your spouse's siblings. That is, your brother's wife is an in-law, but none of her siblings are. And your husband's sister's husband is your in-law, but none of his brothers are. And in-laws pretty much stop with your parents-in-law and your siblings-in-law. You are not in-laws with the parents of your sisterin-law's husband. And the two sets of parents of a couple are not in-laws to each other either; they are the competitive parents -- an entirely different category.

Affinity Relatives

Your husband or wife's blood relatives -- the in-laws that are biologically related to your spouse.

Senate Bill 794 passed in both the Michigan Senate and the House of Representatives. The bill lowered the requirement from 110 to 100 years for access to birth records. It was approved by Governor Engler on August 13, 2002.

There will be a **semina**r sponsored by the **MGC** on Oct. 19, 2002 titled " **Creating a User Friendly Society** ". More information will be available at the September MGS meeting.

The **Council** also noted that the **City of Frankenmuth** is a special place to visit. The **Frankenmuth Historical Museum** tells the story of how Frankenmuth became "Michigan's Little Bavaria"; and the **Military and Space Museum** has displays of uniforms worn by Michigan Medal of Honor recipients. In addition there are displays of more than 353 uniforms and artifacts of Michigan men and women who have served in six foreign wars.

CLUES FOR IDENTIFICATION

Finding a box of old, family photographs can provide a "goldmine" of information, but how do you identify when, where and who if no information is available. There are clues one can use to identify those in the picture. One way involves identifying the era in which the picture was taken.

The **camera was invented in 1839** and photographs with people in them were not made until **1840**. Some early photo's were on glass or tin. The photographs on glass were sometimes called **ambrotypes**. The **tin-type** was a photograph on tin, which was made about the time of the Civil War. So if you have either of these types of photographs, you have a very old photograph.

If the photograph is in color and is fading, it's likely that it was taken when color shots were new. That would be around 1948 or after. If the picture is an unfaded color shot, it is a fairly recent one. Some recent photos have a date printed in the margin. Of course the most difficult pictures in which to identify the people were those taken long ago.

ANNUAL REPORT TO GRACE A. DOW MEMORIAL LIBRARY

Over 1700 people used the Midland Room (genealogy collection) during the past year. Visitors were from all over Michigan (47 cities) plus Midland. They also came from 11 different states and Ontario.

Genealogy volunteers provided over **900 hours** of service in the Midland Room. **Three volunteers** have now given more than **21 years** of service each, serving on a weekly basis. **Jo Brines** recently met someone from Colorado who produced a note that indicated she had assisted them in **1982**.

Editor's note: The three volunteers who have given so much of their time starting in 1981 are Nancy Lackie, Maxine McCullen and Jo Brines. Three others who also spend their afternoons on given days are Mary Lou Hayes, Bob Mass and Marygrace Lenz. Mary Lou also chairs the on-going MGS First Families of Midland County project. Bob supervises and promotes the use of the computer in the Midland Room. Nancy chairs the MGS Library Books Committee whose members include Quita Shier and Lois Baker. COST OF PHOTOCOPYING AT COUNTY CLERK'S OFFICES



Needless to say, we used pen and paper to copy the data we located in the record book.

While doing some genealogical research in Traverse City in late June, Earl and I visited the Grand Traverse County Clerk's office seeking records of an ancestor's death. The staff were extremely cordial and helpful and we quickly located the document we were searching for. However, when we asked to have a photocopy made of the document, we were surprised to hear that a new policy (mandated by the State) has been implemented regarding photocopying documents. **Each** photocopy of a vital record **will now cost \$10** and will be **certified**. Genealogists usually do not need/or desire a certified copy of ancestor records. However, we were told that simple, non-certified photocopies are no longer available from county clerks — at least in TC.

LIGHTENING STRIKES TWICE - OR PERHAPS MANY TIMES By Earl A. Ebach

In the April 2001 Pioneer Record (Volume XXI, No. 4) the lead story was "1886 Love Letter - Does Mary Marry George? ". The article was based on letters in my Midland County postal history collection in an envelope addressed to George W. Brewer of Leslie, Michigan in



Ingham County. The first letter dated Aug. 8. 1886, from Miss Mary M. Sheldrake of Pleasant Valley, Mich., discussed their marriage plans - or lack thereof. She was replying to a letter from George who apparently had recently informed her that he was thinking of marrying another girl. We know. from genealogical research, that Mary did not marry George, but married Leroy D. Alspaugh, probably in 1887 in Jasper Township, Midland

County, Mich. Mary and Leroy raised a family and had a good life in Midland County.


But what about George W. Brewer?

While organizing my deceased brother's Michigan postal history collections, I recently came across another old envelope - addressed to "George W. Brewer, Leslie, Ingham Co.,

Mich." dated "Sep 14, 1885".

Coincidence? Unlikely!

The envelope was mailed from Hovtville. Michigan, a small village approximately 16 miles west of Lansing. Leslie is approximately 26 southeast of Lansing. It is backstamped at the receiving post office " Charlotte, Mich., Sep 14", the same day it was mailed. This is better than the postal service of today. The back of the



envelope also contains the manuscript notations "By reply to No. 4126 from Miss Ivey Farrand" and "To letter Sept - 28 - 1885". George probably replied to the letter on September 28. What "No. 4126" means is not known.

The **Hoytville** envelope also contained a **very personal** yet interesting and intriguing letter - which is reproduced here.

It was written a year earlier (1885) than the one from Mary (1886). It was from another lady, **Miss Ivey Farrand** of Hoytville, Mich. - who apparently has also just been **jilted** by **George**. She infers extenuating circumstances might exist. At one point she writes: "but let me ask one question if things are not all right - what will I do". Later she writes: "I trusted you as you promis to see that I was all right".

But read it your self and arrive at your own conclusions. It is very interesting.

Apparently **George** was quite a "Lothario" - a ladies man - a lover in every town - a "cad" - or whatever. Even so, both women appear to want to continue their relationship; both requested that he continue to write. It appears that **George** recorded the number on the back of the envelope for each letter written to and/or received from his numerous lovers. The **Pleasant Valley** envelope has the numbers "4284" & "4285" written on the back.



GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY DISBANDS

Effective May 23, 2002 the Cadillac Area Genealogical Society officially dissolved, and will no longer be conducting any business or research. All assets were distributed to the Wexford County Historical Society and the Wexford Genealogy Organization.

CLARKE HISTORICAL LIBRARY at CMU

Jo Brines

Late in May about a dozen **MGS members** visited the new **Clarke Library** on the campus of **Central Michigan University** (CMU). The intent was to see this huge, new, very expensive, state-of-the-art library funded by Michigan taxpayers.

The library is four floors high, very open, completely filled with computer stations on every floor. Considering the size of the building, I had great expectations for an enlarged **Clarke Historical Library** area, which includes the **Michigan history and genealogy collection**. I was greatly disappointed when we discovered the Clarke section that is open to genealogists is only a **very small** portion of the first floor.

<u>All</u> the books in the collection are accessible by staff only. <u>Everything</u> needs to be processed by staff. Staff must do all the photocopying. Only two or three computers are available to reference the card catalog.

The microfilm area is a small triangular area, about the size of an alcove, with approximately six computers. The area is less than the size of the Midland Room in the Grace A. Dow Memorial Library. Available microfilm located on a shelf is Michigan census data **only**.

An additional inconvenience is the **absence of adequate parking**. The most convenient place to park is directly across from the entrance. This is a metered lot, good for two hours at a cost of 25⊄ per one half hour. Users must add additional coins to the meter every two hours when their research extends beyond two hours.

The library provides a pleasant eating/snacking area near the front entrance, either for sack lunches or for purchasing sandwiches, etc. from available vending machines.

The library frowns on the presence of briefcases in the Clarke Historical area, therefore users need to use available lockers.



In summary, the **Clarke Library** is **not user-friendly**. For most of the MGS members who visited these new facilities, we found that we needed reference material that extended beyond the state of Michigan. Considering the difference in time involved in driving to the **Library of Michigan** in Lansing versus driving to Mt. Pleasant, and the thousands of additional resources available at the Library of Michigan, **I would choose to drive to Lansing** rather than the Clarke Library to do genealogical research.

RUMORS ABOUT FT. WAYNE LIBRARY

The **Friends of the Library** newsletter, **Summer 2002**, reports that the millage for improvement and expansion of all branches, including the main **Ft. Wayne Library**, was passed and work has already begun.

The main library's collection (almost all) will move in 2003 to temporary quarters at 200 E. Berry Street (Renaissance Square) in Fr. Wayne. This building is apparently close to the present library enabling ease of use by users during construction. Good parking will be available nearby in lots, garages, and along the street. The genealogy collection will remain accessible.

The staff of the Ft. Wayne Library is very pleased and grateful to the Lincoln Financial Group and Murphy and Associates for making it possible to remain downtown while construction of the addition is occurring.

Those **MGS** members planning to visit the **Allen County Library** in Ft. Wayne during the next year should find the temporary quarters readily accessible for **genealogy research**.
