

### FIRST LUTHERAN CHURCH IN SAGINAW


At our MGS meeting in October, Roselyn Ederer spoke on the history of Saginaw and the influence of the German immigrants in its growth and development. I have in my Saginaw postal history collection a letter written by the Lutheran missionary who established one of the first churches in Saginaw. The letter, written May 4, 1852 by the Rev. Julius Ehrhart contains a lengthy report on his ministerial activities. He was the first Pastor of St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church located on the corner of Court and Bond Streets. The church was organized on November 30, 1851, with 22 members of German origin.

The stampless folded envelope pictured here contains on the front the address "To the

American Home Missionary Society, 150 Nassau Street, New York". Itis

stamped with a circular "**PAID 3**" and a circular "**SAGINAW Mich. MAY 4**". It also contains in the lower left corner a manuscript "paid".

On the back of the cover the sender wrote "Rev. Julius Ehrhart; Saginaw City, Mich.; May 3, 1852" and "To Rep.". The receiver wrote "27,372" and "Due 100; Tell him to write in English; Ask sec to write about Synod". It was sealed with red wax.

### IT STARTED WITH THE ROOTSWEB MAILING LISTS -- DAVE RUSSELL

The **RootsWeb mailing lists** for the surname **Foust** and for the location **Knox County**, **Tennessee** have been of particular value to me for researching my wife's family. It was through these two mailing lists that I learned of the **East Tennessee Cousins Homecoming/Reunion** that was held in July of this year in **Powell, Tennessee**. The organizers asked everyone interested to e-mail them with their e-mail address and the surnames they were researching. The **Homecoming/Reunion** has its own website and everyone on the Reunion mailing list received a copy of what people sent in.

One e-mail that caught my attention was from a lady in Madison, Wisconsin named Mona Everett. In her list of surnames was **Bayless**. My wife had a **3<sup>rd</sup> great grandmother** named **Rachel Bayless**. All we knew about Rachel was that she was born about 1794, married a **Robert Kirkpatrick**, and their daughter, **Eliza Jane Kirkpatrick**, married **Isaac Foust** in 1851 in Knox County, Tennessee.

At the **Reunion**, we found the lady from Madison, Wisconsin. When she showed us her notebook on the **Bayless** family, my wife and I could hardly believe our eyes. We found

Rachel Bayless and her husband, Robert Kirkpatrick, and then Rachel's ancestors six generations back to my wife's 9th great grandfather, John Bayley (Bayles).

The "**Bayless Cousins**" are pictured on the right. On the left is **Sue Lewis** of Knoxville, Tennessee; in the middle is **Mona Everett** of Madison, Wisconsin; and on the right is **Shirley Russell** of Midland, Michigan.

We learned that **John Bayley** was born in 1617 in Norwich, England. He left London on 10 June 1635 on the "*Truelove*" bound for the Bermudas and New England as the indentured



servant of William Wells of Norwich. The "*Truelove*" reached **Boston** in 1635. John Bayley and William Wells moved from Boston to Lynn, Massachusetts in 1638, then to New Haven, Connecticut in 1639. In 1640, John Bayley and William Wells were part of a group lead by a Reverend John Youngs that traveled by boat from New Haven to settle in Southold, Long Island.

Even before this **Reunion**, I had an interest in **Southold**, **Long Island** because my 7th great grandfather, **Ensign John Booth**, also settled there in the mid 1600s. We knew that he was involved in the purchase of Shelter Island in 1652, and purchased a lot in **Southold** in 1656.

The Historian for the community of **Southold** was kind enough to send me a map of Southold showing the original lots platted in **Southold** and the list of owners. **John Booth** and **John Bayley** are both listed.

What a revelation - the John Bayley family and the John Booth family both lived in Southold, Long Island at the same time, and owned lots upon which they both built houses on the same street at the same time. They lived about 8 lots apart or about 3500 feet.

The cover contained a **3 page letter** written in **German** by the **Rev. Julius Ehrhart** describing his need for money, his activities and his frustrations with the German congregation. The translation, by parishioner Walter Neuman, follows.

#### From Pastor Julius Ehrhart Saginaw City Michigan, May 3<sup>rd</sup> 1852

#### To the esteemed Committee of the American Home Missionary Society, in New York:

Through your welcome letter of April 8<sup>th</sup> I am informed, that you agree to give me a support sum of \$200 per year, this being retroactive to Nov. 20<sup>th</sup>, 1850, the day of the founding of my congregation.

You will receive my thanks not in words but in my deeds, and I will give it my best effort. I received your esteemed letter last Friday evening, April 30<sup>th</sup>, otherwise I would have reported earlier.

From the following notes you can draw your own statistical conclusions. Aside from the daily worship I hold a regular weekly service. After the sermon or instructions we have some worthwhile togetherness.

Worship service, from Nov. 20<sup>th</sup> until Febr. 29<sup>th</sup> was held on Wed. eve from 7 to 8:30. During that time I explained the Epistle to the Galatians. During Lent from Febr. 29<sup>th</sup> to April 9<sup>th</sup> I held sermons every Friday, teaching the Passion story. From Easter on we again had weekly service on the subject of the major parts of Christian doctrine.

Since we have here people from all parts of Germany, I found in many a lack of knowledge, it was therefore necessary to give much basic religious instruction. In this way my sermons will be better understood. Praise and thanks constitute an important part of these lessons.

Through my efforts I received more members during December.

Four boys and two girls receive School lessons, in the first month, from 8 to 12 and in the afternoon from 1 to 4. Second month only from 8 to 12. I would otherwise not have enough time for my sermon preparations. This schooling took place without interruption from Dec. 1<sup>st</sup> to April 30<sup>th</sup>, in

other words, a full 5 months. From 11 to 12 o'clock I taught the confirmation candidates and kept the other children busy with their writing and arithmetic.

For confirmation class I taught two boys and two girls. The last mentioned had already religious instruction in Germany. These children gave me much pleasure with their eagerness and attention.

People were astounded in their answers to questions, when they took part with the adults. Surely many of the grown ups would not have been able to reply likewise.

In the beginning these children gave me a lot of trouble. I thought it was difficult to continue, especially with the girls. But the presence of the Holy Ghost, was apparent from the beginning.

Sunday after Easter on Quasimodogeniti (low Sunday) night, April 18<sup>th</sup> three of the children were confirmed and were accepted by me as members of the church. A change of heart began in these as they experienced the grace of God in Christ. I surely believe that the good Lord will protect them, and fulfill his promise.

I view these plantlets with special affection, since God transplanted them and the Lord put them in my care. The whole festivety left a deep impression on the numerously gathered congregation.

In my Confirmation Sermon I emphathized, what a malpractise it is in our German Fatherland, to confirm a child matter of factly in it's 14<sup>th</sup> year. That is why it produces so many "in name only" Christians. When one questions them and reminds them of their Baptismal renewal, they reply impudently; the state made me a Christian, and in my stupidity I just followed the others. This shall never be our practise. I shall never confirm a child, who does not understand about the crucified Lord. (he goes on another 7 lines in stilted German, he ends with the wrath of God, if not done properly etc)

On major festive days, Christmas, Good Friday and Easter, many people come who otherwise want nothing to do with Christ. There are a great number of Germans who seldom go to church, and make fun of those who go. I said to them you dummies, you are starting the German churchgoing again, don't you know that you are just exchanging one prison for another, by making fun of the clergy. They do not know real freedom, and think all it takes is fun and easy going. Sorry to say that the greater part of Germans who live here are such people. But they can be saved, the Lord works miracles.

To close correctly, I want to point out, that the stipend of \$200, granted me, as of Nov. 20<sup>th</sup> 1851, ends this year. I take the liberty to ask for part sum of \$100, since I am quite down on money. In the future I would like it quarterly.

Further, I ask, if I should write in German or English, the first is easier for me. Also I again I ask, which synod you want me to join?

This is a **very rare** and **unique** postal history cover and letter. Historically unique in that it describes the **founding in 1850 of St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Saginaw** when Saginaw was just beginning to be developed as a major city in Michigan. It provides backup for the information given by **Roselyn Ederer** in her October MGS presentation.

The frustrations and problems of **Pastor Ehrhart** are evident. The request and questions at the end of the letter are answered on the back of the cover described on page 1. Someone at the **American Home Missionary Society** wrote – "**Send \$100**" - "Write in English" - "Tell secretary to write about which Synod". This technique of writing on the back of envelopes was part of the bookkeeping of the period.



#### OCTOBER 16, 2002 MGS MEETING REVIEW

Mary Lou Pease, Program Committee member, introduced our speaker, Roselyn Ederer, Saginaw historian, who spoke on "Saginaw's Interesting and Varied History".

**Roselyn** is a **writer** with a series of five books to her credit. As a child, both her grandmother and father were **savers/collectors**. Her grandmother saved all of her **valentines** and her father saved **postcards**. She grew up believing that saving things was the thing to do. Now those collections have provided historical background for her writing.

Roselyn started writing for the Saginaw County Historical Society Newsletter. She began as a volunteer



and continued for more than 10 years. She used her grandmother's and father's collections as the stimulus for writing articles about **Saginaw** history. These articles eventually evolved into researching and writing the books about Saginaw.

She discussed her family history as it related to the growth and development of **Saginaw**. All eight of her great grandparents emigrated from **Bavaria**, **Germany**. **1840** marked the time the first **Germans** settled in **Saginaw County**. These **Germans** were **Lutheran** and the clergy designed a plan to build missions to maintain the Lutheran religion amongst the German settlers and also to seek to convert the Chippewa Indians. **Frankenmuth** was started in 1845 as a German farming community of Lutherans and their clergy.

Roselyn asked the question "Why did these Germans emigrate to N. America?" and gave the following reasons:

- 1. to become missionaries;
- 2. the great potato **famine** which began in 1829, caused by a fungus which affected mostly Bavaria , not all of Germany;
- Germany was at peace and families were growing; the land could not support the population;
- 4. the government **paid** citizens to emigrate to N. America;
- 5. in 1869, lumbermen convinced the government to recruit Germans from Bavaria to come to the Saginaw area and **build** a town that would support a lumber industry.

**Roselyn** concluded her talk with a number of interesting stories about the history of **transportation** and **communication** in **Saginaw**. Initially Saginaw rivers were the major highways. The **Tittabawassee** was known as the "log river". **Bridges** over rivers were privately built and owned and anyone using a bridge had to pay a **toll**. In 1850 the **Genesee Plank Road**, the forerunner of the Dixie Highway, was built. Plank roads were also privately built and owned and **tolls** were charged for their use. The first **paved roads** were built by Governor A.T. Bliss (a Saginaw native) in **1902** using crushed stone. In 1906 the Michigan Supreme Court **abolished** all bridge and road **tolls**. **Railroads** were first built in Saginaw in **1859**. As the railroads grew and prospered, river traffic declined. Saginaw had the unique presence of streetcars in both Saginaw City and East Saginaw. The first **streetcars** appeared in 1862 and were **horse drawn**. During the 1890's streetcars were converted to **electric power**, and remained a major form of transportation for over 50 years.

Roselyn Ederer's series of published books about the history of Saginaw is as follows:

- BOOK I: On the Banks of Beautiful Saugenah
- BOOK II: Where Once the Tall Pines Stood
- BOOK III: Once Upon a Lumber Town
- BOOK IV: In Sickness and in Health
- BOOK V: Industry Makes the World Go Round

During the business portion of the meeting, **Kathy Bohl** reported on the latest **Michigan Genealogical Council** meeting. She also reported that the **Midland Chapter of the DAR** is presenting a Genealogy Research Workshop on October 26 at the Grace A. Dow Memorial Library Lounge. Admittance is free.

Membership Committee Co-Chair Sheldon Levy presented their report. The Committee has prepared a new brochure which provides information about the MGS for potential members and other persons.

The **Michigan Genealogical Council** (MGC) will be celebrating it's **30<sup>th</sup> Anniversary** on November 14, 2002. As part of that celebration, **Eunice Pines**, Archivist of the MGC, wrote the following article which appeared in the **MGC Newsletter**, Volume 26, Issue 4, Fall 2002. It is reprinted here with the author's permission.

#### MY MEMORIES OF THE MICHIGAN GENEALOGICAL COUNCIL

The **Council** began in **1972** with **10** societies and the Library of Michigan. From the beginning, there has been a partnership. At one time, the Library of Michigan supplied us with an office and a person to run it. Marlene Thayer was the liaison. She was indispensable to the MGC serving for 13 years on various working committees as well as coordinator of the Sesquicentennial Certificate Committee. I had the pleasure of working with Marlene when I was President. In fact, Marlene asked me to run for Vice President in 1985.

How many remember the **old** Michigan State Library at **735 East Michigan Avenue**? When I went to the **MGC** as a delegate from my local society, this is where we met. It was an old warehouse and not the ideal library setting. I can remember attending meetings in a room so small the table took up most of the room - we scrounged for chairs and sometimes people had to stand. The building was way too small and in March of **1985** a new **\$38 million Library-Museum** was approved. The Michigan State Library collection was housed in rented quarters on East Michigan Ave., much in storage. The State Historical Museum was in crowded rental quarters in the basement of a former insurance office on Capital Avenue. The State Archives on North Logan was more than two miles from downtown. We really needed this new building.

The Council grew too big (for the small room) so while the Library complex was being built, we met at the **Pilgrim Congregational Church** in Lansing. It had a kitchen and one of the fun things we did was to have a spring potluck before our meeting. In May of **1988** we held the first **MGC Genealogy Show and Sell** with many societies participating.

The new Library and Historical Center was dedicated March, 1989. I will never forget the dedication. Mayor Terry McKane gave the welcoming address and invocation. Governor James Blanchard, Secretary of State Richard Austin, Senate Majority Leader John Engler and Lt. Governor Martha Griffiths officiated at the ribbon cutting. Red, White and Blue balloons were released and Dortheia Barnes sang "Lighting the Light That All May See", which was written for the occasion.

The Library administrators, James W. Fry, Head Librarian and Jeffrey Johnson, Deputy Librarian, invited the Council to again meet at the Library of Michigan. We looked forward to our first meeting. I'll never forget that meeting, It turned out the Forum was not ready and we met in the cafeteria. There was no sound system and you know how well I do without a mike. It was very crowded, BUT we were meeting in the Library-Historical Center. Not too long after that we were actually meeting in the Forum.

The **Sesquicentennial Certificate Project** of the Library and the **Council** was a huge undertaking. The final deadline was January 1, **1988**. There were some **7900** applications. This was the first time we had paid employees. Thousands of Certificates were signed during the reign of three **MGC** presidents – Marianne Cox, Eunice Pines and Kim Harrison.

Earlier, in **1976**, we had the **Michigan Centennial Family Certificates** for those families who settled and lived in the state of Michigan on or **before 1876**. In **1982** the **Genealogical Society of Utah** filmed the enormous amount of genealogical material from the **9,337** applications for the Michigan Centennial Certificate. The completed film was placed in the collection of the Society of Utah; a duplicate film was deposited in the Library of Michigan. The Council also opted to put the applications and index on Microfiche.

The **Council** has had many projects and publications: eg., the **1850 Census Index**; the **Surname Index**, **Vols. 1 & 2**; the **First Land Owners Series**; and (due to the efforts **of Dr. Donald DeZeeuw**) the many **microfilm rolls** which were given to the Library (before the Abrams Foundation). In **1988** the **MGC Newsletter**, under editor **Phyllis Thwaites**, won the NGS Newsletter competition in class 3 (over 1000 members).

The **Council** even had a hand in the selection of the first **National Archivist**. President Reagan had someone in mind who did not have the qualifications. The NGS, the MGC and genealogists from all over the country **lobbied** for the appointment of **Dr. Robert W. Wilson**, then Director of the **Gerald R. Ford Library and Museum**. This action did influence the Governmental Affairs Committee and Dr. Wilson was the first archivist appointed under the 1984 law granting the NARA independent status.

One of the funniest things happened when we gave Dr. Wilson a **luncheon** just before his leaving for Washington. My secretary made the reservation at Clara's Restaurant which was located near the old Library. I don't know what the restaurant was told but when we got there we had decorations, table cloths and many waitresses assigned to our group. This was not the ordinary luncheon procedure for this restaurant. Later we found out they thought **Gerald R. Ford** was the honored guest.

When **Marlene** became ill and left the **Library of Michigan**, our **MGC files** were supposed to be placed in two storage files at the Library. After several days I had them ready for transfer. This did not happen and the files ended up on the floor; eventually they were placed in boxes and taken to storage. In the meantime, I had gotten permission to place our Council files in the **State Archives**, where they were eventually placed..

Since 1991, I have been constantly gathering MGC material. We have a retention schedule stating which items are to be stored in our file at the Library of Michigan and which records are to be placed in the State Archives.

Thank you for letting me go down the Michigan Genealogical Council Memory Lane.
