

## Midland Pioneers

This house was built in 1857 by Joseph C. Townsend, Jr. The house was torn down in 1918. It stood at the end of Flint Street, (later the 15th hole on the Currie Golf Course in Midland.

Joseph built a second house in 1868 just east of the one in the above picture. It was still standing in 1950 during the County Centennial, and was occupied by Willis Briggs in 1958.

Joseph C. Townsend Sr. was born in 1788 in Mt. Morris, New York, one of eleven children. Polly Cronkright was born in 1789 in Genesee County, New York. They were married in 1820 and had eleven children of whom three survived. Two of their

surviving children were born in Mt. Morris, New York: Thomas in 1824 and Henry in 1832 (d. 1881).

Like many New England farmers, shortly after Henry's birth, Joseph and some of his brothers moved their families to Michigan. They followed the "Great Trail" west through Pennsylvania and Ohio, and the Saginaw Trail north to the village of Saginaw. It took his family six to eight months to reach the Saginaw Valley area.

In their wagon they lived in succession in the Saginaw, Laporte and Bullock Creek areas for short periods. Finally they settled in the Upper Forks area, later Midland, in 1835 or 1836 and built a cabin. Their third surviving son, Joseph C. Townsend Jr., was born in the Laporte area of what became Midland County in 1834. Joseph Jr. was the first white child born in what is now Midland County.

In 1853, when Midland Township was organized, the first election was held in Joseph Townsend Sr.'s cabin. His son Thomas was one of the election inspectors. Midland County had been organized three years earlier and included what is now Bay County, Gratiot County and Roscommon County.

Joseph Sr. died in Midland at 76 in 1865. His wife, Polly, lived until 1881.

Two of Polly (Cronkright) Townsend's brothers, Charles and Daniel, followed the Townsend's to the Midland area in 1837. They settled finally in what became Homer Township.

Charles Cronkright and his wife, Lydia, had a five-month old son, Charles Jr., when they came from New York to Michigan. Their sons, William (born 1839) and Ira (born 1841) were the second and third white male children born in Midland County. They were cousins to Joseph Townsend Jr. The Townsend children and the Cronkrights only had Indians as playmates.

Charles Jr. was in real estate and lumbering. He married Mrs. Cathrine Starks in 1962. Together they had five children, plus she had five from her first marriage. Charles filled many local political offices in Homer Township as an Independent.

Ira Cronkright was a farmer and lumberman. He married Adriana Adams in 1867 and had eight children. Ira, following his brother Charles' example, held several local political offices as a Republican.

In 1819, the Chippewa Indians ceded most of the Midland Territories to the United States keeping only two reservations. Little Forks was near where the Townsends settled and became Midland. Blackbird was located where Mapleton is now. In 1855, they ceded these lands to the United States and received a reservation in Isabella County. These were the Indians that the Townsend and Cronkright children played with when they came to Midland. The Midlanders were sorry to see their Indian friends move.

The Chippewas fought the Battle of the "Ox-Bow" in 1833 against the Sauks about two and one-half miles west of Midland. The Chippewas won. This was about the time the Townsends were in Saginaw.

Joseph C. Townsend Jr. grew up in what became Midland City and played with Indian children. At 14, he and an Indian friend, Paymoseygay, caught two live bear cubs in a tree. Paymoseygay's mother helped them shake the cubs from the tree. The mother bear threatened their return home but Mr. Townsend, upon hearing the news, came to help, shooting the old she-bear just in time.

# More Pages from the Library

The Library Acquisitions Committee met recently to discuss immediate, and long range plans for the genealogical collection of the Grace A. Dow Library.

The immediate plan is to complete the holdings of published indexes of the Federal Census for the states of Ohio, New York and Pennsylvania. At the January meeting, the MGS authorized up to \$650 to match library funds to accomplish this and to acquire a 3 vol. set of Pennsylvania Vital Records which were recently published.

Long range plans include the following:

- 1. Acquire appropriate Midland County material as it becomes available.
- 2. Acquire genealogical material for counties surrounding Midland County.
- 3. Acquire genealogical material for Michigan counties which were along the most common migration routes into Midland County.
- 4. Acquire census indexes for additional states in New England, along the Atlantic coast and in the Midwest, as funds become available.
- Other resources of exceptional usefulness will be considered as they become available.

Committee members: Marion Berry, Diana Butcher, Maxine McCullen, Audrey Pomranky, and Ed Birkhimer, chairman. Your comments are welcome.

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The Grace A. Dow Memorial Library has purchased the microfilm, "Vets and Vets Widows of Civil War from Midland County." It is in the genealogy department now for our use.
