Leroy, Michigan, August 29, 1910 -- two little brothers, Elmer Brand, just turned 5 and Herbert Brand, age 3, with their tiny faces pressed to the window waved good-bye to their older sister Stella as the train started out of the station on its way to Coldwater, Michigan. Stella Brand, age 15, was sent to Adrian Girls Training School and the boys would begin their new lives at Coldwater Michigan State Public School.

Stella Brand Thomas was reunited with her brother Elmer Brand in the fall of 1942, but died in 1978 without ever seeing her baby brother Herbert again.

Following is the story of how Stella's daughter, Esther Thomas O'Dell, began a quest to find her grandmother (Henrietta Greene Brand) and found her Uncle Herbert.

## **JUST A LITTLE SPARK -- WHERE DID GRANDMA COME FROM?**

When I was told by my eldest sister two years ago this summer that our grandmother was a full-blooded Cherokee Indian, I was in shock for two weeks. I decided I needed to prove whether she was or not. So I called my friend, Stan Berriman, who taught all my children about Indians in American History at Meridian schools. Stan was thrilled and referred me to Nancy Lackie at Grace A. Dow Memorial Library. I've known Nancy a long time, so down to the library I went -- I was just interested in finding out about grandmother. As I got into searching I found records of the Brand family, but couldn't find out about grandma. All these Brand cousins had lived right around us, and were such wonderful people to have lost track of all these years.

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Last fall I got a few of the Brand cousins together to organize a reunion. They came by the dozens, all anxious to meet this crazy cousin. I made the statement that it would be nice if we could find Uncle Herb. Since he is a year younger than Uncle Elmer, maybe he is still living. A lady at the get-together said she thought he committed suicide when his son was killed in the war. I told her I'd have to see it on record before I would stop hunting. She made me more determined to search than ever. I knew the little boys were sent to Coldwater Boys Home and mom was sent to The Adrian Girls Training Center. I wrote the Coldwater Boys Home and they replied they had no records. Last fall I wrote Lansing to the Office of Children and Youth Services and in March, the 14th to be exact, I received the envelope that would lead me to the uncle I had never met.

In the packet of papers I found that the Frank and Elsie Wild family had gone to Coldwater Boys Home and taken my uncle to raise on the farm in Clare, Michigan. So I got my Clare phone books out and there was a Clay Wild listed. I called him, he had me call his mom, who sent me to her cousin and she gave me the phone number of Frances Adams, Frank and Elsie's daughter. When I got Frances on the phone and told her who I was, she cried for 20 minutes -- she was so thrilled. When I asked if Herb was still alive and she said yes, it was my turn to cry. Herb was in St. Louis, Missouri, so I called there. The phone rang and a man answered. I asked, "Is this Herbert Wild?" He said, "Yes." I said, "I have reason to believe you are my Uncle Herbert Brand." All was quiet. Man, I thought, I found him and killed him with shock. Then he said, "Who are you?" I told him I was his sister's daughter. He replied that he wasn't aware of any brothers or sisters. When I informed him he was the youngest of twelve children, he couldn't believe it. I told him I would send him pictures, copies of the family tree and anything else I thought he might be interested in, and that we would like him to come home and meet his only living brother. He said, "I'll catch the train or bus and come and see you in July." I told him he had been put on the bus and train too much already. Two weeks later he called and asked if he could come now. So my brother and I went to pick him up. What a sweetheart of a person -- he sure belongs to us. He and his brother look and act just alike. He also has my mom's humor and many of her actions, even though they were separated when he was 3 years old and Uncle Elmer 5.

We are planning a big Brand reunion this fall and I hope by then I can find that Cherokee grandmother.

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## MORTALITY CENSUS 1880

Midland County, Mich.

June 1, 1879 to May 31, 1880

STANFORD, Maria C., age 24y, married, bn Mich; father bn Mich, mother bn N.Y.; housewife; d. Oct.1879, tuberculosis; resided 8 mos in county.

HALL, infant, age 22 days, bn Mich; father bn Mich, mother bn Ireland; d.Feb.1880, inf. of lungs; resided 22 days here.

BRACE, Zebobia, age 27y, married, bn Mich; father bn Conn., mother bn N.Y.; d. Oct.1879, inflammation of womb; resided 18 yrs in county.. "She had taken cold after confinement".

BROOKS, Margaret, age 65y, widow, bn Penn.; parents bn Germany; d. Aug.1879, inflammation from friction(?); resided in county 15 yrs.

WOOD, William, age 32y, single, bn N.Y.; parents bn N.Y.; farm laborer; d. Dec.1879, rheumatic heart; resided in county 16y.. "He went to take homestead on line of Tuscola & Huron Counties and died in about 10 days. But in which county or name of town is unknown."

BURROUGHS, J.E., age 1y, bn Mich; parents bn Mich; d.May 1880, inflammation of lungs; resided in county 1y... doctor stated "amputation of thigh..congestive pneumonia"...died in Flint, Genessee Co., Mich.

HORNLEY, Katherine, age 46y, widow, bn Ireland; parents bn Ireland; d. Aug.1879, disease of liver; resided in county 11y...city of Porter.

AMERICAN INDIAN FAMILY LINES -- If you have North American native ancestors, or think you might, the publication American Indian Family Lines might be your answer to questions about genealogical research. This magazine is published three times yearly and each issue contains at least 30 pages, is fully illustrated, and indexed. Queries are free. There is a free "Tribal Branches" section where readers may have two pages of their Indian Lines pedigree charts published at no charge. The publishers claim a readership of over 1000. THE INTERNATIONAL SOCIETY OF THE DESCENDANTS OF CHARLEMAGNE has announced that the society is once again taking applications for admission. WARNING OUT LAW -- notice given to residents of less than three years in a town, who were destitute and apt to become the responsibility of the town for maintenance. (Frequently widows left with a family.) Such persons then usually returned to their former place of residence and no disgrace was involved. (Kalamazoo Valley Heritage, Vol. 13, #9)

THE OHIO DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH has transferred all death records over fifty years old to the Ohio Historical Society: 1-71 and 17th Avenue, Columbus OH 43211. From January 1937 to present write to: State Office of Vital Statistics, Ohio Department of Health, G-20 Ohio Departments Building, 65 South Front Street, Columbus OH 43215. Death records prior to December 20, 1908 can also be obtained from the probate court in county where death occurred. The Ohio Historical Society now has an index to death records from 1908 to 1931 microfilmed and death records from 1908 to 1922 microfilmed. It should not be much longer until all death records are microfilmed. (Kinship Tales, Vol. 7, #1 - May '89)

CIVIL WAR PHOTOS -- If you loan your photo of a Civil War veteran for copying, the Department of the Army will send you a free 8 x 10 photo of each one you send. Their goal is to have a likeness of every Civil War soldier. These photos are catalogued and available for researchers. Include as much information as known. Write Michael J. Winey, Curator, Department of Army Military History Institutes, Carlisle Barracks PA 17013-5008 (several sources)

PASSENGER LISTS OF SHIPS ARRIVING QUEBEC CITY -- the passenger lists for ships arriving 1865-1869 have been indexed. If your ancestor arrived in Canada during this period you may write to National Archives of Canada, 395 Wellington St., Ottawa, Ont. KIA 0N3, and ask if they will search the index for your name. Address your letter to the "Service Section". Also, NAC has pictures of most of the ships, which they will copy for you.

EARLY ONTARIO NEWSPAPERS -- National Archives of Canada (address above) has a collection of early Ontario newspapers. They will do a search and copy obituaries. You must supply them with the name, locality and date of death. They will search a two-week period of that date. Minimum charge \$2.00/order or \$.50/copy. (Via Gas Lites, Vol. 12, #3 -- Spring '89)

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"GRAVES GIVE AND TAKE" -- a new newsletter about Graves family lines will be published four times yearly starting in August, 1989. Interested persons are asked to share Graves family pedigrees, histories, inquiries, reunion dates, book reviews, wills, obits, military records, etc. Subscription - \$5.00 for the rest of 1989 and after that \$10 yearly. 1861 Michigan State Gazeteer  
Midland City

"A small post village and capital of Midland county, situated at the head of steamboat navigation on the Tittabawassee river, 122 miles from Detroit; fare from Detroit, about \$4.00. It contains one Methodist and one Presbyterian denomination, but no church edifices; a weekly newspaper, the Midland Sentinel, published by N.T.Carr; two lodges of Good Templar, two saw mills, two general stores, and a number of mechanics' shops. The merchants receive their goods via Saginaw, thence to Midland by steamboat. It has three mails a week. Postmaster: John Larkins; township supervisor: N.T.Carr; clerk: William Condley.

MIDLAND...A township in the county of Midland. It is pleasantly situated on the north bank of the Tittabawassee river, near the confluence of the Chippewa, 150 miles north-west from Detroit. It is connected by a tri-weekly steamer with Saginaw city and East Saginaw. Population: 500."

1863 Michigan Gazeteer

"Midland County...bounded on the north by Gladwin county, east by Bay and Saginaw, south by Saginaw and Gratiot, and west by Isabella, and containing an area of 576 square miles....The surface is level, in some parts gently undulating, and covered with a heavy growth of excellent timber. The soil is unsurpassed for farming purposes, being a rich black loam which produces wheat, corn, potatoes, etc., in the greatest profusion. But a small portion of the county is settled, the balance being an unbroken forest....The county has three organized townships, Ingersoll, Jerome, and Midland, with a total population of about 2,000." (note that the population quadrupled in two years!)
