His name and 11 others were attached to the petition addressed to the Supervisors asking for the organization of the township. The Supervisors ordered the organization January 24, 1879. David P. Waldo was elected the first Supervisor. Midland and Ingersoll are the oldest townships in the county, having done business some 60 years.

STORIES FROM OUR PAST

MIDLAND, MICHIGAN, THURSDAY, OCTOBER 30, 1929

Sol Gowings and 140 Guests Celebrate a 50 Year Ago Day
With Open House October 26

"'Aunt Em' Thurber having left the last of her six 'boys' contentedly finishing lunch at her capacious table, she and we hurried over to 'Sol' Gowings in order to catch 'Sol', her sister's husband, before he went to work again for the afternoon.

"And in our haste we overdid it, probably. At any rate, the Gowings were just finishing their own midday repast when we arrived. But they good-naturedly allowed they'd had enough till supper time, and came in to tell us about their golden wedding. We could have told there had been something up, by the white and gold streamers from the chandeliers and the bouquets of gold mums here and there, with gold ribbons and cards suspended. These remained from the party Saturday celebrating the event fifty years ago Sunday.

"It was that half-a-century-ago day that we were thinking mostly about, too, as we looked at the gifts and heard about the big family dinner celebration last Saturday. It's a funny thing how little people seem to think about the original wedding when the golden one comes around.

"'I'll bet you were scared that day.', we guessed. And Mr. Gowing grinned and admitted he was.

"'I should say they were,' said Ant (sic) Em. 'Sol's hair stood right up straight. My sister and his brother stood up with them, and they were so scared they didn't know what to do, but Sol was worse yet.'

"The Gowings looked at each other and grinned good-naturedly. 'Where was it,' we asked, 'not here?'

"Here we had to resort to the wedding certificate, which came down from its place on the wall to supply the name of the town.

"Trowbridge, Ontario, Canada, it turned out to be. And the date October 27th, 1879. 'What did you wear?' 'There's a wedding picture on the wall, too' says Mr. Gowing, 'but wait, there's a little one you can see better.'

"Forthwith came a little album with a brass catch, and a tintype set into the page. And there they stood, her hand through his arm. Sure enough, he was scared after the traditional fashion of grooms, but the bride was calm, after the fashion of all brides. Her dress was a basque with a multiplicity of buttons, and an overskirt with a drape, over a pleated under portion. Her hair was smoothed back over her forehead. Her partner-for-better-or-worse was attired in a suit of dark stripe, but away coat, stock, . . . 'And my Dad's shoes,' finished Mr. Gowing.

"They had had the picture taken at Listerville, nearby, after the ceremony in the Methodist parsonage, and had come to her parents' home at Molsworth, and then had gone at once to the home of his 'Dad', where the threshing was on.

"Then we had to ask how they happened to meet...where they had first met each other. Mr. Gowing couldn't remember. 'Annie', he asked, 'what was the first time I ever saw you?' Mrs. Gowing knew. 'Why I came over to your house with Jane and Lottie,' she said laughing. 'We pretended we came to see the old folks, but we really came to see the young fellows.' 'Now a bit different than young folks are today,' said Mrs. Thurber. 'And then we went together for seven years,' said Mrs. Gowing.

"How did you happen to come here to Midland?' 'Well,' said Mr. Gowing, 'my father, Sam Gowing, was hunting land, and he went clear to Nebraska without finding anything he wanted to buy. Finally he came clear to Poseyville and located on the old Keep farm. That was the year after we were married. We all came and lived together with him for one season, then split the farm and each of us boys took 40 acres. I took the farm Feusse owns now. My folks lived with me.'

"Asked whether any single event or year had left its deepest impression on them than any of the others, the Gowings reflected a minute. 'Not unless it's the time George Strowbridge got lost,' he said. 'He borrowed George Anger's gun and went hunting. Got lost and all the neighbors took their guns and went hunting for him. They agreed to shoot off their guns if they found him, for a signal. They found his body in a brush heap. He was only lost about three days but it was cold, with a heavy fall of snow, although it was only October.'

"We moved to Midland 22 years ago,' he went on after a while, 'and lived on the corner of Rodd and Buttles Streets for a long time. I've done about every kind of work you could turn your hand to, since I've been in town...carpentering, painting, masonry. I didn't intend to do anything at all when we moved in, but that doesn't do,' he averred, shaking his head.

"And so, the long and short of it is that the Solomon Gowings held openhouse at 1101 Ashman Street from ten in the morning until four in the afternoon Saturday and were visited by about 140 of their friends, relatives, and members of their church (the Nazarene) to honor the day. And they received twenty dollars in gold and a table lamp from members of the family, and flowers...big and baby mums, and yellow roses...from friends.

"If you're going to say anything about it in the paper,' said the fifty-years-ago bridegroom, 'I hope you'll thank everyone. I couldn't say anything while they were here.'

"The Rev. Wiggs of the Midland church spoke a few appropriate words, and a prayer, and a rousing family dinner at which more than 75 relatives were present, rounded out the celebration.

"The Gowings have three adopted 'children'...James Grasley of Midland, Mrs. James Hepinstall, who used to be Maud O'Dell, and 'Jimmie', a sophomore in high school, who still lives with them.

WE HAVE READ

We genealogists becomes so intent on looking for courthouse type records in print that we often neglect expanding our knowledge concerning genealogy in general. The following books, found in the Grace A. Dow Memorial Library, were chosen to give you background, especially concerning names.

"FIRST NAMES FIRST", by Leslie Alan Dunkling, published in 1977 ...has interesting data on first names in English-speaking countries...a book to browse through if you'd like to know what names were popular from the 17th century on, or if you think the census taker didn't know what he was doing when he wrote your ancestor's name; it just might be he was correct. (Call No. 929.4D)

"THE NEW YORK TIMES OBITUARIES INDEX", published by the N.Y. Times in 1970...contains 353,000 names that have appeared in that paper from 1858 to 1968. These do not include paid notices. Consists of surname, title (if any), reference to year, date, section, page and column of the original story. (Call No. R 929.3N)

"AMERICAN SURNAMES" by Elsdon Smith, published in 1969...gives background on the evolution of surnames, and covers all aspects of them including change of names by immigrants in the U.S. An excellent surname index in the back of the book allows you to quickly check references to specific names. (Call No. 929.4)

"FAMILY NAMES", by J. N. Hook, published in 1982...begins with the background and origin of surnames, goes on to weave the story of America's history with notations on the meanings of the names and includes along the way how and why the many immigrants came and settled in this country. Some interesting statistics of the 1790 census will appeal to genealogists. Included are chapters devoted to each nationality, how names were changed, and where they concentrated in America. If you don't have time for the whole book, be sure to include reading the last chapter. The final paragraph sums up the book thus: "in general, we've accepted people's names without much fuss. They're here - 1,286,556 names - getting stirred around more and more in our big salad bowl. And maybe that's a pretty good sign." (Call No. 929.4 Ho)
